

AND MR. BORDEN
SAYS CANADA CAN'T
BUILD BATTLESHIPS

(The Outlook, New York, Oct. 11.)

The Argentine battleship *Rivadavia* has been completed by a firm in this country. The trial trips of the new vessel along the coast have been a marvelous showing, indicating that she can do much better than the twenty-knot and a half knots called for by her contract.

In the opinion of some qualified observers, the *Rivadavia* is the most powerful vessel afloat. It is certainly a satisfaction that she has been ordered by the United States, and it is a still greater satisfaction that an American firm got the contract. It is a satisfaction to all of the world. This was because its bid was the lowest.

English ship-builders in especial were much nettled at the discovery that apparently they could not build ships as cheaply as we could, and one firm in particular, the Harland and Wolff, of Belfast, in consequence of the assistance, as it alleged, of "powerful rings" in this country, able to "control the supply of armor and armament."

The shipbuilding company above referred to is the Fore River Shipbuilding Company, of Quincy (Mass.), whose works have been described by the Boston Herald as having been built by about 4,000 men, were described by Hon.
