

## Dentals Lose a Very Close Game

HAMILTON TIGERS STAGE LAST MINUTE RALLY AND WIN 4-3 GREEN IN LIMELIGHT

Clever Centre Player Though Injured Scores Winning Goals.

Hamilton Jan 31—In another of those great contests such as marked the previous meetings of the same teams the Tigers to-night defeated the Dentals by the score of 4 to 3 and again took the lead in their group for the O.H.A. senior honors. It was anybody's game until the final whistle announced the cessation of hostilities—both teams battling for all that was in them for the full sixty minutes of play, and emphasized the fact that neither team has much on the other.

For the first two periods Tigers appeared to have the edge but in the final session the Dentals came back strong and succeeded in tying the score that had until then stood 3 to 1 against them.

When it began to look like the Tigers were weakening and the hopes of their supporters were beginning to fade, the wearers of the yellow and black stage one of their sensational rushes and notched the goal that won the game.

This was only a couple of minutes before full time and thereafter the locals were content to play a defensive game.

Play Proves Strenuous.

The play was more strenuous than either of the two former clashes of the two teams both teams checking hard and occasionally indulging in what looked like intentional rough play. There were several casualties during the evening but one team did not suffer more than the other. Toward the close of the second period Glen Smith of the Dentals tripped Green of the Tigers. The local player fell heavily on his chin and was carried unconscious to the dressing room, but his injury was not sufficiently serious to prevent him from coming back about the middle of the final period and he had the honor of scoring the winning goal. Early in the game Matte collided with Goalkeeper Stewart of the Dentals, and he went down for the count, but he struck to his guns and stopped many a wicked shot whereafter. Then comparatively early in the third period Stewart stopped a hard shot by Reise with his right eye and went down for the full count. The optician was badly damaged and his teammates wanted the plucky little goalie to retire, but he refused to desert his post. The game was delayed for about a quarter of an hour while his injury was being patched and the greater part of the final period he had the use of only one eye, but that did not prevent him from performing in his usual brilliant style.

Despite the efforts of the Tigers to stop him, Brown was again the outstanding figure on the Dentals team being easily the fastest and trickiest man on the ice. Particular attention was paid to the youngster by the Bengal forwards, but time and again he succeeded in eluding the whole team and forced his way right in the net. Twice he succeeded in getting the puck past Reaume, but he gave the Tiger's defense more trouble than all of the other visitors combined. Box also played a brilliant style but the

McCarthy and Hudson were best, but their work was marred by their apparent playing the man rather than the puck.

Shorty Green used as a substitute in the former games with the Dentals was given a chance to-night to show what he really possessed and he made good with a vengeance, in fact he was the star of the game, his rushes and back-checking being features of the contest. He had the honor of scoring the first and also the last of the Tigers' goals, and on several other occasions caused the Dentals' defense a lot of worry. Roach and McCarthy also played well, being prominent at all times, but they had nothing on Joe Matte who staged a number of zig-zag rushes getting through once for a goal and another time passing to Roach in front of the net and giving the little fellow another chance to notch a tally.
