## U. N. B. Are After The MacTier Cup

### Preliminary Steps Taken Which May Lead to Game for Red and Black in Montreal--Have Run Up Big Scores And Their Line Has Not Been Crossed Since the Opening Game--The Centre College Colonels of English Rugby.

University of New Brunswick's sensational 1925 team are in many ways duplicates of the famous Colonels of Centre College, Kentucky, which proved the sensation of the United States college football a few years ago.

"Bo" McMillan and his famous collaborators in the Colonels were picked for a student body which had not as many dozens in their numbers as the larger universities of the United States had thousands of students; so it is with University of New Brunswick's English rugby team, and they have been riding rough shod this season over the best teams that larger institutions in the Maritime Provinces can produce.

They already are acknowledged champions of New Brunswick and have won the championship of the western section of the Maritime Provinces Intercollegiate Rugby League and they are conceded the Maritime Intercollegiate championship. In their intercollegiate league games they have run up scores which total 43 against their opponents' nil, while their whole season's scoring record is 97 in five games against their opponents 3. The only time U. N. B.'s line was crossed this season was in their first game.

And now University of New Brunswick want to emulate the example of the famous Colonels of Centre College and journey to the big cities of U. N. B. want to play in Montreal for the MacTier cup, indicative of the English Rugby championship, and they are making preliminary enquiries as to how they can get into competition for the MacTier trophy. The U. N. B. team's forward line averages over 180 lbs. and include several players fast enough to be back division players on most teams; their half line includes three of the fastest sprinters in the Maritime Provinces today. They have what is regarded as an all-star team and they're anxious to have a chance to do their stuff in Montreal.

Harry B. showed a mile in 2.08 1/4 in a trial at Charter Oak Park, Hartford, Conn., the past summer, and according to all reports he is not the only one to be purchased for Capt. Merriman. He also bought during the overcast meeting at Windsor, Conn., near Hartford. When Holmes passed through Fredericton on a still hunt for racing material for 1926 a year ago he bought the red and black, for whom he had won some races at the fall-end of last season, had commissioned him to buy a free-for-all trot.

Another Record by Baron Worthy. Speaking of free-for-allers? Those who predicted that Baron Worthy, 2.01, would not get the half-mile tracks have proven poor guessers. Recently it reported that in six weeks Baron Worthy had broken five track records in Pennsylvania and Ohio. Now he has reduced the track record at Frederick, Md., from 2.08 1/4 to 2.06 1/4. Prospective Down East purchasers of Baron Worthy when he left the Murphy stable were told he would not make good on the double ovals. Searcy, 2.05 1/4, which he has been jogging this fall and which he had inasmuch as the preparation for the 1923 racing campaign for which it is hoped his injured ankle will be in fit shape.
