Cut by Jr. Sabres, McAllindon bounces back

The scene for revenge couldn't have been better if Shakespeare was rewriting Hamlet.

Gary McAllindon of Mississauga stood on the mound against the Mississauga Metro Fence Junior Sabres last Wednesday, hoping to pitch his Brampton team to victory. McAllindon was

cut by the Sabres in the spring after being told that there were enough pitchers on the club already. However, with help from Ron Cabot, McAllindon joined Brampton, which needed good pitching about as much as the drought-ridden West needs rain.

"I just wanted to get back at those guys," ad-

mitted McAllindon after the game. "I felt strong after three innings and I tried to go as long as I could but my arm hurt too much after six innings to continue."

McAllindon allowed only one hit through the six innings he worked, but the Sabres came back to beat Brampton 5-1. Rick Brown of the Sabres completed the pitching duel by

yielding only two hits and striking out 11 through seven innings. Russ Brahm fought some minor control problems to pick up the save.

"We didn't have the bats out there tonight," said Sabres' coach Bill Moulton. "McAllindon pitched a fine game."

McAllindon was forced to retire prematurely due

to a recurring elbow problem. The aggravation started last year and causes his arm to swell after every game.

"One doctor told me it was tendonitis and another doctor said it was tennis elbow," said McAllindon. "They don't know what's coming off. I've tried acupuncture, a masseur and cortisone shots but nothing has worked. I think that a good tenseser will put enough pressure on it to help me pitch."

"He was throwing really well," agreed Sabre Perry Marshall. "He knows how to mix his pitches and he has a good fast ball and curve."

The Sabres picked up three runs in the seventh when Greg Cranker

walked, Al Gorrill and Dave Evans were hit by pitches. Andy Brahm singled with the bases loaded and Steve Barron followed Brahm with another single.

Gorrill was the only Sabre with two hits. Brown started to work smoothly in the sixth and seventh innings as he struck out five of six batters. However, his control was off earlier in the game when it took as

many as 27 pitches to get through an inning. The pitches he did get over were almost untouchable.

Rockies, Aeros draft ex-Derby Mike Dwyer

A former Streetsville Derby was the 74th player drafted in the National Hockey League amateur draft held this week.

Mike Dwyer of Mississauga, a left winger with Niagara Falls Flyers

of the OHA Major Junior A league this year, was drafted in the fifth round by Colorado Rockies. He was also drafted by Houston Aeros in the ninth round of the World Hockey Association draft.

Dwyer got off to a slow start with the Flyers this season after being acquired from Windsor Spitfires on October. "By the end of the year he was our best offensive player and finished with 35 goals and

40 assists in 59 games," says assistant Flyers general manager Paul Winnell.

Dwyer scored 20 goals and 28 assists in 42 games with Windsor in 1975-76.

Gibson, Venner steal Derby awards night

Veterans Jim Gibson and Gary Venner and rookie Leo Brideau dominated the awards ceremony at the Streetsville Derbies wind-up banquet Friday night in Streetsville.

Gibson, whose outstanding play with the Central Ontario Junior B hockey champions earned him a scholarship to Cornell University, received three awards including the prestigious James V. Rutledge Memorial Trophy as the team's most valuable player.

Gibson also won the team scoring trophy and the Vic Johnston Trophy as the top point-getter in the three stars competition.

Venner was named the most popular player on the team and also won the Bev Stringer Trophy as the most valuable player in the playoffs.

Brideau, who stepped from the Streetsville Midgets up to the Derbies, won the Len Lee Memorial Trophy as the club's top rookie and the

Club Founders Trophy as the most sportsmanlike player.

Dan Sutton, who will attend Michigan University this fall on a hockey scholarship, was the winner of the William Hutt Trophy as the most valuable defensive player.

Steve Blair, a teammate of Brideau with the Midget team two years ago, won the Derby Fan Club Trophy as the most improved player.

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Questionable vote ends Mason's streak

As far as Mississauga Boxing Club coach Bev Grimmer is concerned James Mason still hasn't lost a boxing decision. Unfortunately for Mason, his record will show a defeat.

Boxing for the first time since he won a gold medal at the Ontario Winter Games in February, Mason suffered a split decision defeat at the hands of Wayne Halfkenny in Hamilton last Tuesday.

The defeat was Mason's first in eight starts.

"We were robbed," said Grimmer. "The crowd booed the decision even though Halfkenny is a Hamilton boy."

"James was a little rusty at first but he outboxed him in the second and third rounds. He deserved to win."

Mason was to meet Halfkenny in a rematch Friday night in Welland,

but Halfkenny didn't show. Mason instead won a unanimous decision over Richard Heul of Hamilton to run his record to 8-1.

Glen Cripps of Mississauga won his first bout at the Ontario Junior Boxing Championships in Toronto Saturday. He won a unanimous decision in a Junior B 85-lb. class bout.

He will meet Paul Parisi of the Cabbagetown club Saturday in Scarborough.

Brother Greg Cripps won by a unanimous decision over Fred Fielding of Cabbagetown in a Junior C 100-lb. class bout.

However, Cripps lost a close decision to S. Lal of West Hill in the next round and was eliminated from the championships.

"It was a very close fight," said Grimmer. "The decision could have gone either way."

Fastball tournament set

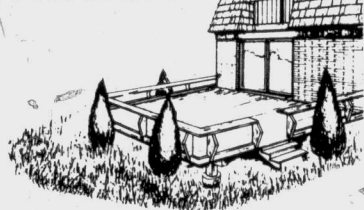
The second annual Robin Lee Sports Fastball Tournament gets underway Saturday with last year's champions back to defend their titles.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE
Take notice that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Mississauga on the 13th day of June, 1977, decided to designate the lands and buildings known municipally as The Region of Peel Police Department Streetsville Station (formerly the Old Streetsville Grammar School), 327 Queen Street South (Lots 7 and 8, Registered Plan STR. 3), as a property of historical value or interest under the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, S.O. Chapter 122.

SHORT STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION:

The Region of Peel Police Department Streetsville Station (formerly the old Streetsville Grammar School) is recommended for designation on architectural grounds as a good example of Italianate style architecture in public buildings. On historical grounds it is recommended for designation as the first Grammar school in the Township of Toronto. Built in 1851 it continued in use as a school until 1951. In 1966 it became the Streetsville Town Hall and is currently a station for the Region of Peel Police Department.

Notice of objection to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty days of June 22nd, 1977.
