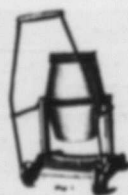

To the Editor G. G. Guide:

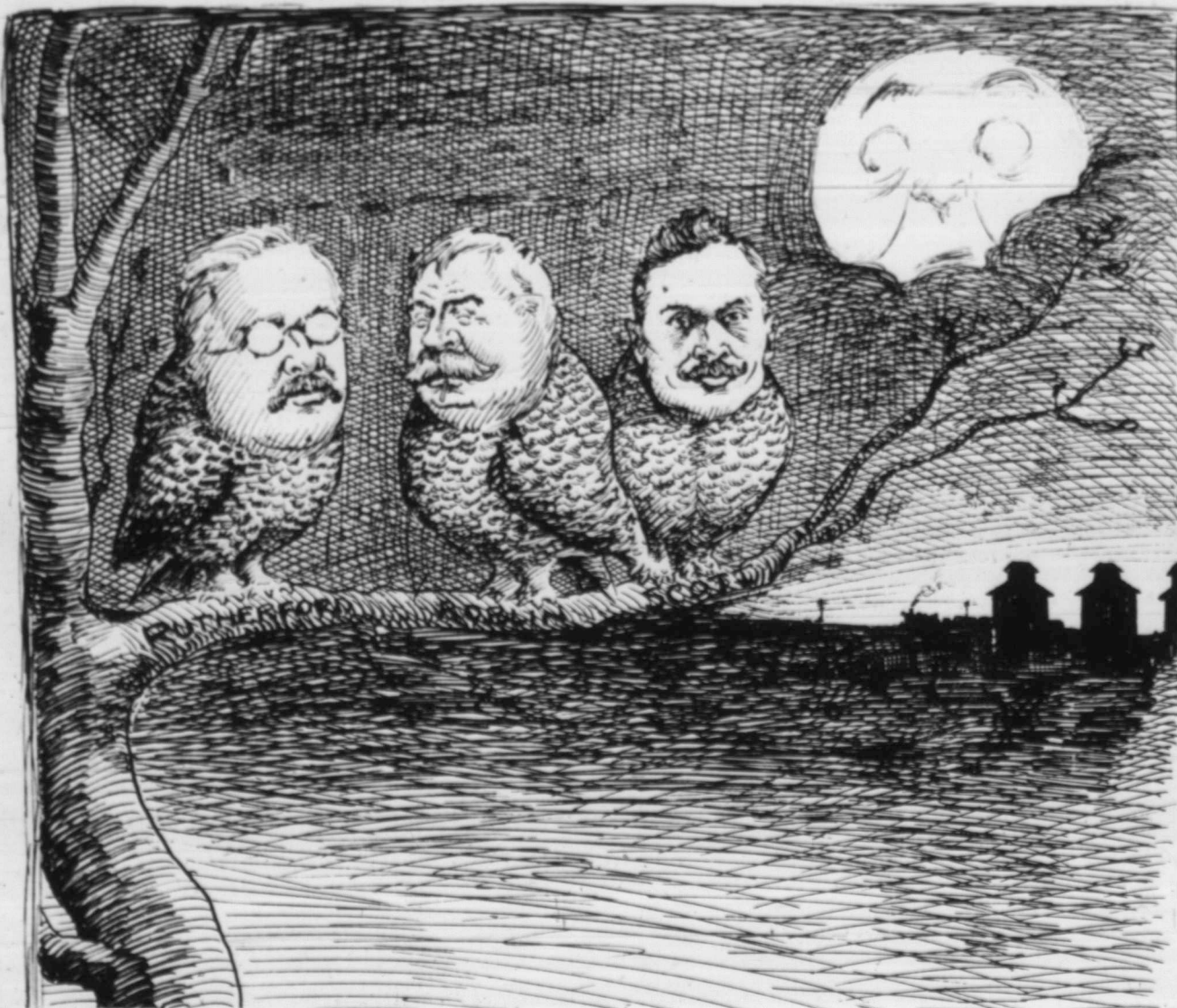
