MADE A VOYAGE ON A SLAVE SHIP

Nova Scotian Had No Suspicion of its Character When He Shipped 57 Years Ago

Eastport, Me., July 10.—Now in his eightieth year, and having recently celebrated his golden wedding in the same house and same room where he married Miss Mary Spencer (now seventy-five years of age.) Stuart Colwell relates his experiences fifty years ago when he enlisted on a ship which later turned out to be a slaver bound for South Africa.

Born in Newport, N. S., and coming to Eastport when a boy, Colwell early in 1861 signed articles to ship in the full rigged brig Murray of New York of the Wards, which was then at Machias, forty-five miles from here, loading lumber for what was stated as St. Thomas, W. I.

Reaching the brig with several other young Eastport seamen, Colwell started on his voyage, not knowing that he discovered that the brig was fitted for carrying slaves; but it was too late to turn back and he had to make the best of it.

Instead of making for the West Indies the brig headed for the African coast. Reaching the Danish port of St. Thomas, she discharged her cargo of lumber and then proceeded up the Conco, where 160 negroes, men, women and children were taken on board under an armed guard of ten Spaniards. Then the anchors were raised and the run for a Cuban port began.

Ten days after crossing the Equator an English frigate, hove in sight, and when the captain of the slave ship refused to heave to a few shots were fired, carrying away his foremast and doing other damage to the ship. Then the British man-of-war came alongside and took the officers prisoners. The brig was taken to the coast of Africa, the crew was landed at Sierra Leone Bay, and the negroes were liberated.

The brig's crew included four officers and ten seamen. Colwell shopped for Marselles, France, and later sailed to Cork, Ireland, and after several other voyages reached America. The brig was stripped of her rigging and valuables and then fired. Meanwhile the Civil War had broken out and on reaching New York Colwell enlisted in the 65th New York and served until the end of the war, when he returned to Eastport.

Colwell made many voyages after words, and visited many parts of the globe. A few years ago he retired from the seas and has since resided in Byron Street, in the same house where he was married half a century ago. He has one daughter, Mrs. Edmund Gilchrist, and a grandson, who make their home with the Colwells.

RECORD SHIP BUILDING

SLAVS MAY CAUSE THE UNDOING OF THE DUAL EMPIRE

Austria's Offensive Lingered Because of Refusal of Slavs to Fight Against Italy

The Christian Science Monitor carries an interview with Miss Olga Masaryk, the daughter of Professor Thomas Masaryk, who are together working in the United States in the interests of the Slav people. Miss Masaryk declares that the rebellion of the Slav elements against Austria on such a scale as to completely cripple the offensive power of the empire is within the range of practical consideration. She affirms that Austria would have started her offensive against Italy some weeks ago, if it had not been for the refusal of the Slav elements to fight against their own kinsmen in the Italian armies. Miss Masaryk says the Allies could rely upon the resistance and revolt against Austria of 30,000,000 Slavs and Latins, if aid was given to the movement for the independence of Bohemia, Jugoslavia and Poland.

Guilelmo Ferrero, writing in the Italian paper, the Secolo, urges the Allies to encourage in every possible way the forces of dissolution within the Austrian empire. If something could be brought about in Austria resembling the Russian revolution, he says, the cause of the central powers would be lost, because, in the case of the collapse of Russia, though that event was a great disaster for the Allies, it was compensated for by the addition of the United States to the Allied ranks; but in the case of a similar occurrence in Austria, there is no country to take her place; it would simply mean that Germany would lose her most powerful ally.

PAINTERS IN CONVENTION

HAMILTON, Ont., July 9.—The fourteenth annual convention of the Canadian Association of Master Painters opened in the Royal Connaught Hotel this morning with an attendance of about 300 delegates. William Delaney of Niagara Falls, president, was in the chair. Following prayer by Rev. W. A. McIlroy and an address of welcome by Mayor Booker, Mr. Delaney addressed the gathering on matters of the trade. There was never a time, he said, when there was greater need for broad technical education. The increased cost of materials, should come in for investigation and serious attention would have to be given the increased cost of labor. He referred with pride to the large number of master painters who have become knaves.

ASKS ROOSEVELT TO HELP RECRUITING

Col. Arthur Lynch Sees End of Erin's Dream if Hun Wins; He Writes Colonel

Dublin, July 10.—Col. Arthur Lynch, M.P., Nationalist M.P., for West Clare, who recently accepted a commission in the British army and has come to Ireland to assist in the recruiting campaign, has sent an eloquent appeal to Col. Theodore Roosevelt for co-operation in Irish recruiting. He asks Col. Roosevelt to send a message to the Irish people or to come himself to Ireland, in the course of his communication. Col. Lynch says: "Send me a word of encouragement, or better still, my splendid friend come yourself in all your prestige and help win the souls of the young men of Ireland to the Allies' cause."

"There are grave and deep difficulties, lamentable stories of cheated hopes, unrecognized rights and hatreds for wrongs inflicted in the past. But one feature throws these matters into the proper perspective—the fact that the Germans are thundering at the gates of Paris and are hampering the channel ports. If they win it will be needless to make plans for Ireland's dreams of liberty. Potsdam will take care of Erin."

"When the Stars and Stripes was raised over the cause, when Old Glory had blown out her folds, the emblem of liberty, a sign of protection to the Irishman, I had hoped that opposition to the allies would close. But ancient wrongs and present resentment proved too strong."

SHOP TRADESMEN ASK WAGE INCREASE

Formal Conference Held Today in Hope of Averting a Strike

By Courier Leased Wire. — Montreal, July 8.—A further conference between the members of the Canadian Railway Board and the representatives of the Federated Shop Trades Brotherhood, whose demands for a wage increase may result in a dominion-wide strike, was held to-day. It began at 10 o'clock this morning.

At the lunch hour, Mr. Hungerford of the railway board, said that negotiations had been resumed and were proceeding satisfactorily. It was intimated to-day that every possible effort would be made to prevent the tie up of transportation in Canada that would result from a strike of the employees. It has been claimed, by a strike of the other classes of railway employees. Short of impossible consequences, it was hinted the railway war board will make every possible effort to meet the demands of the men and to preserve industrial peace.

One of the union officials admitted that there is a radical element in the delegation ready to proceed to the most extreme lengths to gain their ends. It was said that the decision to communicate with the local unions throughout Canada on the question of calling a strike if the full terms asked of the companies was by no means unanimous.

GERMANS SEEK TO PUMP PRISONERS

Send Out Special "Scouting Troops" to Capture Lone French Soldiers

French Headquarters, July 8.—In order to obtain information as to what was passing behind our front, the Germans formed "spechttruppe" or "scouting troops"—specialists in kidnapping isolated French soldiers in the hope of extracting from them information.

The German army order deals with the organization of spechttruppe and the qualities necessary for its officers and men. The command is especially anxious that its own under similar circumstances should be disposed to be too communicative. Two recent orders signed by General Ludendorff point out that blabbers are guilty of high treason to their country and their comrades. It is said that the French prisoners evade examination and declare that they have just returned from leave. This says Ludendorff, should be told to the soldiers for their guidance in the event of capture.
