THE TRIBUNE'S DIATRIBES.

R. L. Richardson in his paper, the Winnipeg Tribune, works off a lot of the bile in his nature which always rises to the surface whenever Walter Scott's name is mentioned in an article entitled "Walter's Modesty," which might be effective if true. It is, however, false in every particular.

When it is noted that the Regina Leader is as much the personal property of Mr. Scott as is Mr. Scott's hat, the exquisite delicacy of the above extract will be fully appreciated.

The Tribune's attitude is a slightly peculiar one. It is, however, thoroughly consistent with its inconsistent course. No paper was ever published within the bounds of this wide Dominion which so beset itself with its owner with fulsome praise and disgusting flattery as did The Tribune in its laudations of R. L. Richardson when that individual was an M. P. or was trying to become one.

The reason for The Tribune's constant belittling of Mr. Scott is not far to seek. It thought Mr. Scott at Ottawa should have employed himself pushing Mr. Richardson's little apple cart of pet hobbies. Instead of that Mr. Scott pushed to the fore the real needs of the western settler, obtained redress for them of many abuses, and earned a place in the estimation of the people which R. L. Richardson longed for and strove for but could not attain.

In a recent issue The Leader had occasion to sound a note of warning with regard to a possible aggravation of the noxious weed nuisance in the province.

THE EXHIBITION.

The Regina exhibition of 1907 is now an event of the past, and it is possible, at least in some ways, to size up its excellencies and its shortcomings.

Under the circumstances there appears to be no escaping the conclusion that the present railway facilities are absolutely inadequate to meet the transportation needs consequent upon the expansion of the country, but he would be a bold man today who would unhesitatingly suggest a remedy.

Where noxious weeds are observed the inspector usually notifies the owner or occupant of the land in question that unless the weeds are destroyed in five days a councillor of the local improvement district, or any other person designated by the inspector, will be authorized to do the work, the expense incurred being recoverable either by distress or in the form of taxation.

While dealing with this phase of the exhibition The Leader would offer one suggestion. The exhibition requires a new main building, or a manufacturers' and industrial building it might be called, if it is to take rank as one of the big annual fairs.

Meanwhile the people of Saskatchewan will be well advised to stock their coal cellars. For months past those in a position to speak with authority upon the fuel situation have been endeavoring to impress upon the public the urgent necessity of laying in their winter coal supply.

FARMERS AND PHONES.

From the first moment of their taking office, nearly two years ago, the Scott Government have shown a practical appreciation of the fact that the backbone of the Province is the agricultural industry and that the needs of the farming community legitimately deserves a first call upon their attention.

Speaking of the instructions given to Mr. Francis Dagher, the telephone expert being employed by the Government, Mr. Scott stated that "beyond instructing him that the chief end of any policy which we may adopt must be the provision of telephone facilities to the rural communities, and that the Government has an absolutely open mind on the whole question of ways and means to that end, we propose to leave the expert entirely unhampered in his investigation."

That the Government is right in considering the rural communities first in connection with any telephone policy which may be adopted is hardly to be doubted. Under even the best of circumstances, the prairie farmer leads a more or less isolated life and anything which will tend to lessen the sense of distance which is present to so great an extent cuts him off from the rest of the world is assuredly to be welcome.

There are those who complain that the Western farmer looms too large at times in the country's legislation, but such people forget that the prosperity of the towns and cities of our prairie provinces is necessarily largely dependent upon the prosperity of our farmers and that anything which tends to lighten the lot of the tiller of the soil, thus adding to the stability and permanency of the agricultural community, must also, even if in but a secondary sense, be also to the advantage of the populous centres.
