The Graham livery and feed barn is to be torn down. The property on which it stands is owned by F. N. Darke, who has announced that he is going to build a handsome block on that corner. The first storey will be built this year and will be occupied by stores.

The bakers of the city have decided to raise the price of bread. The price will now be ten cents per loaf, or thirteen loaves for a dollar. They account for the rise by the increase in the price of wheat and flour. Up until Monday bread could be obtained for five cents per loaf.

Books to the number of 644 were loaned by the public library for the week ending Saturday last against 638 for the preceding week. The total is made up as follows: Religion 7, sociology 6, natural science 10, useful arts 21, fine arts 11, literature 19, history 13, travel 32, biography, 10, fiction 437, juveniles 74, German 4. The percentage of non-fiction was 23.3 against 22.8 for the preceding week. There are 935 borrowers on the list, of whom 37 have withdrawn owing to leaving the city or other causes.

The large number of Federal College Students that have recently accepted positions leaves room in the institute for a few others who may enter any time up to the 3rd of May. The great demand for Federal specially trained office assistants will be secured for every student, when qualified, who enters for the summer term. This is an excellent opportunity as the classes will not be so crowded as during the preceding term. The work of this institution is recommended by all who are familiar with its facilities for imparting a practical business education.

Geo. H. Stacey of Regina, has been in the city for the last week, representing the Independent Lumber Co., which recently sold out its large business in Saskatchewan. In spite of the fact that he was informed that the lumber business of Lethbridge was overdone, Mr. Stacey says it looks good to him and his company have decided to open up at once. They have leased property in the elevator district and have many

carloads of lumber ready on the way. They expect to be open for business in two weeks time. The company, in which a number of B.C. mill owners are interested will put in 15 or 16 yards in southern Alberta and Lethbridge will be their headquarters.—Lethbridge News.

One of the practices which tends to keep the municipal lodging house of New York from becoming too popular with certain types of unfortunate is the vaccination ordeal through which many have to go. Among other restrictions, the rules forbid a lodger the wearing of any other apparel when going to bed than those provided by the institution, all clothes worn by the lodger on entering the institution are fumigated in order that vermin and germs of disease may be destroyed, all applicants must take a bath unless excused by the doctor, bottles of liquor must not be brought in, and statements must be absolutely truthful. A typical view of the vaccination victims appears in the May Popular Mechanics.

Shingles Go Up.

Vancouver, B.C., April 20.—British Columbia shingles advanced in price ten cents today. This increase has been expected for the past three weeks by the trade, owing to the fact that the mills have for the past month been inundated by water. So great has been the demand for the past two weeks that yesterday a conference of owners of the largest producing mills in Vancouver decided that the time had arrived to make an advance. An agreement was accordingly made and this morning notice was sent out to all travellers to advance their quotation on shingles to \$2 f.o.b. Vancouver. This rate applies to British Columbia shingles and is the basis on which all grades for lower grades are made.

Last fall and during early part of winter shingles were selling in Vancouver at \$1.45 and \$1.50, there being practically no market. Demand was poor throughout the winter, but now the mills are receiving more orders than they can readily attend to. It is not probable that the advance in price will result in any decrease in demand, seventy-five per cent of which comes from the United States, where high grade shingles of British Columbia command the highest price on the market.

To Impeach Tweedie.

Ottawa, April 18.—It is rumored here that an attempt will be made to impeach Lieut.-Governor Tweedie of New Brunswick. The Hazen government, it is said, will make complaint on the basis of the commission will take up the complaint and press for impeachment. This was the action in the case of Lieut.-Governor Letellier St. Just of Quebec, many years ago. If this action is followed by the resignation of Tweedie it is difficult to see how Mr. Pugsley can remain in office despite the loyalty of Sir Wilfrid to his colleague.

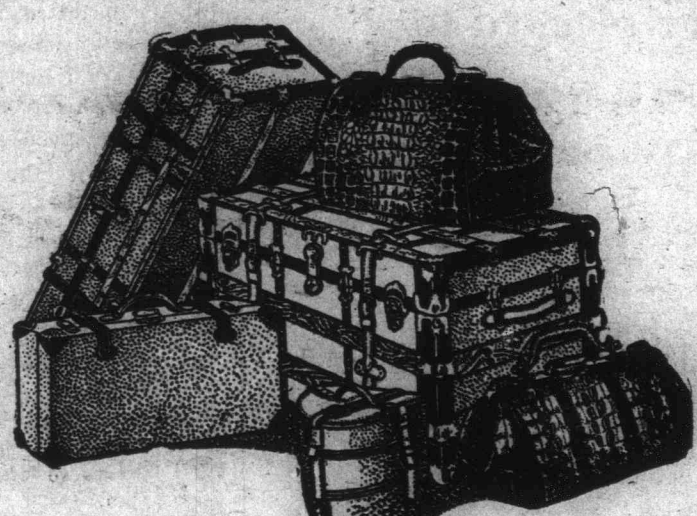
