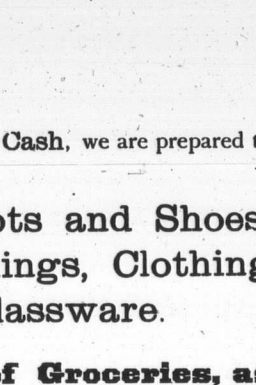
OAK LEAF.
