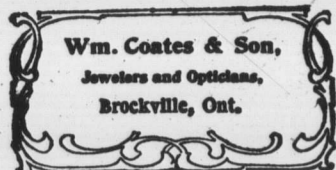

The plans of the K., S.F. & O. Ry. have been filed with the town clerk showing the entrance to Smith's Falls, and will come before the Minister of Railways on the 15th. The News says the plans of the C.N.R. have not yet been submitted to the town, but may come before the Minister at the same time.

The Ontario Government has decided to call for tenders for the publication of Public school readers, as a result of legislation enacted last session, following the Text-book Commission enquiry. It is expected that readers will be issued at a cost considerably lower than those in use at present.

Messrs. J. E. Blanchard and B. Howe, divinity students at Wesleyan College, Montreal, are spending a few weeks in Quebec Province in evangelistic work. —The 41st Regiment have completed final arrangements for the big military demonstration and field day of sports to take place at Brockville on Victoria Day, May 24th. The 8th Royal Regiment of Quebec, 500 strong, accompanied by full brass and bugle band, will arrive at Brockville by special train and take part in the military manoeuvres on Friday afternoon.
