Prof. Cope says he once found a specimen of this species, which had captured a family of meadow mice, which it held in the following manner: One it had swallowed, one it was in the act of swallowing, and two others were securely held in two turns of its body so tightly as to render them incapable of biting their captor. They also feed to a certain extent upon frogs and toads, and, in so doing, lessen their economic value slightly, but, on the whole, they are decidedly beneficial to the farmer and should be protected.

Uses of the Toad.

Another useful, but not ornamental fittle batrachian deserves more consideration at our hands than it generally receives, and that is the common toad. Unfortunately it is the victim of ignorance and prejudice, and is often wantonly destroyed, because of its somewhat unprepossessing appearance. From an agricultural standpoint, however, it is one of the most valuable animals we have, and should be protected with the greatest care.

The toad is of direct service to man by reason of the fact that its food consists of insects exclusively, and that it is one of the few animals which can adapt itself alike to the farm and garden, and will even be perfectly contented if confined in a greenhouse of propagating frame.
