HALIFAX AWARD AND PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

There was a paragraph in the manifesto issued by the Hon. Dr. Pugsley to the electors of Kings County which has perhaps not attracted the attention it deserves. The more immediate and partisan interest in the so-called Rothery forgeries has perhaps been the cause of this neglect, but at this distance from the scene of the immediate conflict it may perhaps be proper to refer to a matter of permanent and far reaching effects, leaving the discussion of the immediate issue in the County of Kings to those more closely connected with that county.

The reference in the paragraph was to the possibility that the Halifax award with interest would have to be handed over to the provinces in the east, which have fisheries for which compensation was granted. When the Washington award was made in 1871, the money was paid over to the Dominion without much if any question; and was added to the capital account of the Dominion. It was assumed then that the fisheries were a national concern and that both the burden and the profit of them should naturally come to the Dominion. There was no word of the Provinces then and it was not till the question of jurisdiction was raised in another connection that the problem of the allocation of the Halifax award came into view. The Judicial Committee of the Imperial Privy Council has decided that the fisheries are the property of the Provinces and not of the Dominion as a whole; and apparently if this be the case the Halifax award should have been paid over to the Provinces in 1871. For the jurisdiction is no new matter and if the fisheries were the property of the Provinces in 1871, the award also was. But in the meantime the award has been withheld for thirty years and more; and the money all have been deprived of the amount of the Halifax award is about ten millions, which is quite a substantial sum to be distributed. And we may look to see the Provinces involved make a strong fight for their rights. The apportioning of this amount would be a matter of great difficulty, perhaps; but it is obvious that New Brunswick will receive a large share, for we have fisheries on both coasts and very valuable fisheries too. We may look to see the Local Government make a strong fight to secure the Province's rights in the matter and for once, at least, we will be presented with more than a non-committal speech from the Throne. For, if as seems probable, after the Attorney General's reference the Local Government declares its intention of seeking to secure its share, the public will have every reason to be interested, for there can be no doubt that the amount to be received by this Province will exceed the total present debt of the Province, the wiping out of which will be a matter of congratulation.

THE GLOBE AND THE YORK VACANCY.

The St. John Globe is rather indignant that there is no prospect of an election in York County before the coming session of the Local Legislature. This is perhaps as it should be. St. John shows a remarkable interest in promoting party fights in this constituency. The Sun succeeded in forcing a contested bye-election upon this county and the result showed that the people of this county have remarkably strong ideas about managing their own affairs without interference from the outside. In general we should agree with what the Globe says about the advisability of filling vacancies as quickly as possible. The Globe, however, is not always of the same mind in the matter. It, at least, does not always express that mind, for when several Dominion Liberal seats were left unfilled in the Upper Provinces for long periods the Globe had nothing to say in condemnation of the Dominion Government and the Liberal party at Ottawa. But for the Globe, apparently, circumstances alter cases; and a neglect by the Dominion Government which may be passed over becomes a serious offence that requires a protest when perpetrated by the Local Government, with which the Globe is not in sympathy.

As a matter of fact, if blame is needed, it is the people of this county that should receive it, for there is a very general disposition as shown by opinion on the street, to regard a local bye-election at the present moment as a nuisance to be avoided. People feel they have not enough of bye elections for one winter, and apparently they would rather go into the present session of the Local House with three representations only than face the turmoil of a local election. Neither party is moving in the matter. The Opposition are quite content to reserve themselves till the approaching general election; and the supporters of the Government feel that there is little call for them, so shortly after the recent election, to show once more how strong is their hold on the county. On the whole the people are apathetic and care little for the excitement of an election. And after all if they are content, why should the people of S. John care.

NEW BISHOPRIC.

Dawson City Honored by an Appointment from the Pope.

MONTREAL, Feb. 25.—Word has been received in ecclesiastical circles in this city of the decision of His Holiness the Pope to divide the arch diocese of Athabasca, and give Dawson City a bishopric. The new bishop of Dawson will be Rev. Mr. Breyant, O. M. I. A missionary, now working in the Mackenzie River District, but who has, so far, received no word of his appointment, and may not for some time, until he comes back to civilization later on.
