The Harpurhey Show.

As far as men, women and children were
concerned, was by far the best we have seen
in the County of Huron. We think that not
fewer than fifteen hundred persons were on
the street, at one time of the day, and besides
these, the two hotels were chock full through-
out the whole day. The crowd on the street
was, of course, composed of persons with
their wives, sons and daughters, and it is no
fatality to say, that it would be difficult to
find such a turnout of strong, healthy, clean
and honest rural population in one village,
as was to be seen in Harpurhey on Friday
last. The show of cattle, we think, was not
so good, either in number or in quality as we
have seen on some former occasions in the
same place, though there certainly was a few
superior animals, and a two-year old and
three-year old, both in milk, and shown by
Alexander Broadfoot Esq., were equal to
any of the same age we have ever seen in
Huron. There were two or three other good
milk cows exhibited, and a considerable number
of young animals, conspicuous among
which were some good steers. Working oxen
were in good numbers, and among them were
two yoke of excellent beasts. Several spans
of strong, handsome horses were exhibited, a
few young horses, and some brood mares and
foals, of which, a horse foal of Thomas Mc-
Michael's was notable for size and strength
of bone. We did not see any of the owners
of the various kinds of stock, but their names
will appear in the Prize List. The show of
sheep was good, and more than an average
number were on the ground, including two
or three good rams. The swine tribe was
but indifferently represented in name, but
by the gigantic dimensions of the two pet ani-
mals exhibited by Mr. Crosswell of Tucker-
smith. These two, taken in regard to size,
form and bodily condition, are superior to
any we have ever seen, even at the Provincial
Exhibitions—they are exhibited at a place
any show of beasts, and would be no discredit
to Wombwell's Menagerie.
