**Special Evening Telegram.**  
**HALIFAX, June 16.**  
 Capt. Larnder, of the cable ship Mackay-Bennett, has received from Vincent Astor a cheque for \$2,000 to be distributed in gratuities among the crew. The captain is also advised that a gold watch is being sent him personally.

**LONDON, June 16.**  
 While Premier Asquith was holding an official reception at the India Office in honour of the King's birthday, an elegantly attired suffragette, announced as a guest, approached him and tried to tear the epaulettes off the Premier's official coat. The woman was dragged away from the Premier and ejected from the building, despite a stubborn resistance. A couple of minutes later a youth, aged 20, when introduced to the Premier, took hold of his arms and shouted something inaudible. He also was unceremoniously thrown out.

**CHICAGO, June 16.**  
 Its closing hours attended by exhibitions of intense partisan and personal feeling among the members, the Republican National Committee concluded last night hearing contests involving 254 seats in the National Convention, which meets on Tuesday. Of these Taft has won 235, and Roosevelt 19. Roosevelt was acclaimed by thousands when he arrived here late on Saturday. His hat was in the air throughout the automobile ride from the station to the hotel, waving salutes and acknowledgments. Cheers marked his progress. Roosevelt declared that he had not mapped out any plan of campaign. After several hours' consultation with his managers he assumed charge in person.

**MONTREAL, June 16.**  
 What probably will be one of the most important speeches in his career will be delivered by Henri Bourassa at the French Congress to be held at Quebec this week. Bourassa's subject will be the future of the French language and the French Canadian people in Canada. Representatives all over the States will be present, the assembly being the most important of its kind ever held in America. It is expected that Mr. Langvin will make an important and exhaustive pronouncement on the school question. The object of the Convention is to discuss what progress the French speaking people in America have made.

**ALBANY, June 16.**  
 The police have discovered no clue to the identity of the parties who placed on the New York Central Railway, in front of Roosevelt's flying Chicago special, a huge boulder that came within a hair's breadth of wrecking the train near Rockefeller's home in Tarrytown. As the train was sweeping around a curve at 60 miles an hour, the locomotive smashed into a boulder two feet in diameter. The cow-catcher of the train was crushed by the impact, and a fragment of the rock tore a hole into the pipe connecting the airbrakes. As a result the brakes on all the cars on the train, including that occupied by the Roosevelt party, suddenly locked. Several of the passengers were thrown violently forward from their seats. Roosevelt's car was fourth from the engine. He was reading when the crash came. The book was jerked from his hands by the shock. "I couldn't imagine what had happened," the Colonel said later. Roosevelt and the other passengers were in great danger. That the cutting of the air-brake pipe probably prevented the derailment of the train was the opinion of the engineer and conductor. Roosevelt was probably the least perturbed of any on board.

By the Fogota we learn that there is a splendid fishery to date at Twillingate, good trap work having been done. Three traps average 500 qts. each and the general average for the others to date is about 200 qts. The fish has slackened off now as the herring school is over. Not much is being done with hook and line. South of Twillingate, unfortunately, there is no fish, except at the Grates, where it struck in last week, the N. E. wind having driven it along. Saturday, traps averaged there from 30 to 40 qts., and fair work is being done with hook and line.

### The Steam Roller.

 The steam roller is a political traction engine which is used to convert a minority. It is never steamed up unless somebody is short a few votes of controlling the convention, when it is brought out and run over the southern delegates in a reckless and fatal manner. This device is comparatively new. It was invented in 1908 by Postmaster General Hitchcock, who ran all four wheels over Joe Cannon's boom and flattened out several other worthy citizens who were hugging the ground with one ear. The first type of steam roller was a crude affair, but the 1912 model comes fully equipped, including a pile-driver attachment guaranteed to produce a committee on credentials which will seat everybody who does not harbor any insurgent microbes. There are several forms of steam roller, but undoubtedly the most effective is that constructed for the use of the national committee. This machine is noiseless in operation and is generally feared by some ripe mathematician, who subtracts a sufficient number of contrived delegates to make sure that the voice of the people will be heard in the roll call. If anybody objects to the grand total, he is conciliated with a copy of the campaign text book and some timely remarks about Abraham Lincoln and the full dinner pail. This year there are two determined and well-lubricated steam rollers in operation, each of which has spikes in its shoes. When they meet in convention assembled somebody is going to be sorry that he forsook the hazelbrush and got out where people could ventilate his past life. If a candidate who has been run down by a steam roller regains his breath in time to cry "fraud" in bright brimstone accents, he can retire to another hall and run on an independent ticket. This is a dangerous procedure, however, as the November elections are liable to be purified by several first-class funerals.
