Cable News.

HALIFAX, Nov. 28.
The collier Inverky, due here Nov. 22nd, with a cargo of Welsh coal for the battleship New Zealand, has not yet arrived.

VERA CRUZ, Nov. 28.
The British cruiser Suffolk, flagship of the West India Squadron, arrived to-day and anchored outside the port. She will enter later and coal.

DUBLIN, Nov. 28.
The Unionist Party to-day carried war into the enemy's camp when Bonar Law, Sir Edward Carson and other prominent men arrived to deliver in the Irish capital a series of speeches against Home Rule. In reply to a deputation which welcomed him, Bonar Law reiterated that Unionists had opposed consistently the whole idea of the separation of the United Kingdom and insisted that the Government must seek sanction of the people before attempting to make a change. During the speech in the afternoon before the Unionist Association he said Asquith's speech of the preceding day seemed to him a complete acceptance of the order of John Redmond for full steam ahead, and if that were so the difficulties of the Unionist Party were gone. Suffragettes attempted to reach Law as he was driving to the residence of Lord Iveagh. They bombarded him with pamphlets. Mrs. Skiffington and Mrs. Connery, leaders of suffragettes in Dublin were arrested.

Portia Back.

The s.s. Portia, Capt. J. Kean, arrived back from Western ports at 11 o'clock to-day. The ship, after leaving here, made a good run to Bonne Bay, her terminus, and reached there on Sunday night last. A rain storm was then raging which alternated to a blizzard the next morning when the Portia left to come east. Favorable weather prevailed on the return trip and none of the storm similar to what we had in St. John's was experienced on the south coast. She brought a full freight and these passengers: Messrs. 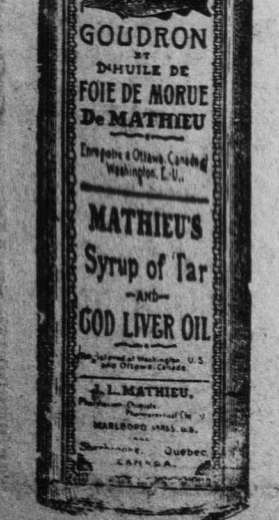
