J. W. Morris, of the Reid Mfd. Co. wrote he was unable to make any further reduction in the bills for street lighting.

The Eastern Trust Co. made application for a rebate on the taxes paid on property formerly Empire Wood Working Co. No action.

A petition was read from the residents of Bennett's Mill, Monkstown and Military Roads, protesting against a prospective laundry in that neighborhood. Referred to Solicitor for report.

James Hand, employee Sanitary Department, asked to be paid for the time he was laid off sick. No action.

The Health Officer's weekly report was read.

Regarding the drain near the East End post office, it was ordered the Engineer see to it.

After disposing of some routine business and passing pay rolls and bills, the meeting adjourned.

**To the People of Russia.**

"The following Declaration by the British Government to the Peoples of Russia has been published by the British Representatives at Vladivostok, Murmansk, and Archangel:—  
"Your Allies have not forgotten you. We remember all the services which your heroic armies rendered us in the early years of the war. We are coming as friends to help you to save yourselves from dismemberment and destruction at the hands of Germany, who is trying to enslave your people and to use the great resources of your country for her own ends.

"But we wish solemnly to assure you that, while our troops are entering Russia to assist you in your struggle against Germany, we shall not retain one foot of your territory. We deplore the civil war that divides you, and the internal dissensions that facilitate the German plans of conquest. But we have no intention of imposing on Russia any political system. The destinies of Russia are in the hands of the Russian people. It is for them, and for them alone, to decide their form of Government and to find a solution for their social problems.

"Peoples of Russia! Your very existence as an independent nation is at stake. The liberties you have won in the Revolution are threatened with extinction by the iron hand of Germany. Rally round the banner of freedom and independence that we, who are still your Allies, are raising in your midst, and secure the triumphs of these two great principles, without which there can be no lasting peace or real liberty for the world.

"Peoples of Russia! We want not only to stem German penetration, but to bring economic relief to your ruined and suffering country. Some supplies we have sent, and there are more to follow. It is our wish to develop the industrial and natural resources of your country, not to exploit them for ourselves—to restore the exchange of goods, to stimulate agriculture, and to enable you to take your rightful place among the free nations of the world.

"Peoples of Russia! Unite with us in defence of your liberties. Our one desire is to see Russia strong and free, and then to retire and watch the Russian people work out its destinies in accordance with the freely-expressed wishes of the people."

**AUSTRALIA'S ANSWER.**  
"It is tragic to think of the misery and suffering which have overtaken Australia, with the rest of the world, in the interval between the King's first visit to the site of Australia House and his formal opening of it on Saturday," says the Daily News.

"Over 50,000 killed, over a quarter of a million wounded: it is a terrible toll for a small nation of five millions. In Gallipoli and in Flanders Australian soldiers have proved once more that there are few troops in the world to equal them."

**CANADA'S ANSWER.**

"The Canadians have made for themselves an imperishable name in the history of arms; they have been associated with many of the most glorious passages in the record of war, and there is no force fighting for the Alliance which has a richer share of honour," says the Telegraph.

"Four years ago Canada had an army of barely 3,000 men. Since then 400,000 men have crossed the sea to fight in the ranks of the Canadian corps, and to-day it is over its strength. That fact is announced by the Duke of Connaught."

**UNITED STATES ANSWER.**

General Pershing now has 1,000,000 American troops under his direct command, as a result of transfers of American divisions which had till recently been brigaded with British troops. This announcement has been made by General Peyton March, American Chief of Staff.




