Cat Out Commitments.

According to present indications, there will be good demand in the United States markets for large and medium Newfoundland herring of the Scotch pack method. One buyer has already at this early stage written to a firm here, stating that he will be in the market to purchase the fish here on the spot, and that though the new tariff regulations of the United States might bear heavily on herring, yet the shippers should not mind it, thus insuring that the price will be sufficient to offset the extra tariff charges. We understand the United States market is now practically empty of Scotch pack herring. The Scotch pack the past season was practically nil, due considerably to the big coal strike in the British Isles, which necessitated the laying up of the steam drifters. The Alaska herring trade has to look to this country for its supply of large and medium fish.

It is important, however, if we wish to retain this trade that strict attention be given to the grading of the fish and of their cure. And we would impress upon the packers the advisability of cutting out the consignments and insist on outright sale. It is just as well to keep their fish in their stores here, as it is to ship them to New York and get no returns. While you hold your goods you retain control of them, but when you consign them you place yourself at the mercy of the consignee and the outcome is usually very unsatisfactory to you.—Western Star.

Invention of the Balloon.

The idea of soaring through the clouds was not conceived in the brain of an adventurer nor in the workshop of a great inventor. It first occurred to a cloistered monk, Brother Albert of Saxony an Augustine monk who lived in the fourteenth century, first conceived the invention. The actual balloon was made by Francesco Mendosa, a Portuguese Jesuit, who died in 1528. His experiments followed, but the substance of Albert's and Mendosa's inventiveness was not made really fruitful use of until Henry Cavendish, the English chemist, discovered in 1782 that hydrogen was 10.8 times lighter than air. Progress became rapid after this, and before long European inventors began to improve on the prevailing methods. The first attempt at a "dirigible" is credited to J. B. Laite, a Frenchman, who in 1783 exhibited the model of an "aerial ship," equipped with a screw before the Academy of Sciences at Paris.


Premiers of Empire Address the King.


London, Aug. 7.—An address presented by the members of the imperial conference to King George after reaffirming their loyal devotion says:—

Silk Made From Milk.

At the present time France leads the way in the manufacturing of various useful articles from milk, which is first turned into curds, then parboiled and exposed to the air, and finally treated with a certain kind of spirit. After this the milk will have turned into a substance as plastic as putty which can be very easily moulded or rolled.

With judicious care in the boiling and spirit treatment, the milk may be brought to any desired consistency, and can even be used as a substitute—and a remarkably good one, too—for silk, in the manufacture of fine underwear; or it may be so treated so that it may be used in the manufacture of a widely assorted number of articles, among which are "silk" socks, sausage casings (a horrible idea), gramophone records and many others. The "silk" looks and feels like silk, but is, of course, very much less expensive. The sausage covers are made by treating the sawdust chemically and rolling it out in a thin line.


