Curlers' Memorial Day
GOVERNOR PRESENT—CITY BANDS PLAY—AIR FLIGHTS AUCTIONED.

The much talked of Curlers' Memorial Day dawned bright and frosty. With four splendid sheets of ice the programme for the day opened at nine o'clock with scratch matches being played until eleven. At eleven o'clock a game between the lady and gentleman curlers was played. All the heads were keenly contested and the ladies were mainly victorious. At 12.15 the aeroplane, piloted by Major Cotton, with Capt. Bennett, Mr. A. S. Butler and Col. Nangle aboard, passed over the Rink grounds where all the Curlers had assembled. Joventures of the flight were dropped, but the prevailing high wind carried them out beyond their objective. A special package had been arranged for the Curlers but, owing to the winds, it was not found practicable to drop it. In the afternoon a very large number of spectators were present to witness the games as they were played. From two to four scratch matches were played. At four o'clock His Excellency the Governor arrived and was welcomed by President W. H. Duler, the Honorary President and the Secretary. His Excellency remained for the rest of the afternoon. From four to six a costume match was played on one sheet, on the three other sheets the following games were played, Bowling's versus Bankers, Reid Nfld. Co. versus Job's and Lawyers versus Doctors. High teas and suppers were served by the lady curlers in St. Joseph's Hall, which was kindly placed at their disposal by Rev. Fr. Pippy, and were well patronized. During the evening, afternoon teas were also served in the Rink. In this way a considerable amount was added to the total. From seven to nine scratch games were played. During the day the city bands were in attendance, the Guards in the morning, C.C.C. in afternoon, and C.L.B. at night and rendered excellent music.

At nine o'clock the grand Auction of goods donated by the Curlers was held. The auction was presided over by Currier John O'Driscoll in his well known style. Refreshments were served during a lull in the auction by the House Committee under the chairmanship of Jas. R. Chalker, in a manner which won the highest praise of all. Throughout the auction, which was the most enthusiastic ever held here, the bidding was very brisk and the prices obtained were in many cases greatly in excess of the values placed originally on the goods. The auction of three flights in the aeroplane, so generously donated by Major Cotton and Captain Bennett, evoked much interest. The first trip, auctioned by Mr. O'Driscoll, was knocked down to Mr. Gerald Harvey, the second put up by Mr. A. S. Butler was knocked down to Sir John Crobie, the third offered by Major Cotton was bought by Mr. T. Hallatt. Captain Bennett then auctioned the streamers of the packet of tickets for the Curlers. These were in German colours and were taken from an enemy plane which he had brought down while in France. The Nangle then offered for sale a walking stick which was of an unique design and would prove of considerable use to pedestrians. When it had been disposed of he presented a duplicate to the Secretary, Mr. A. H. Salter, to whose efforts and enterprise the success of the whole day was due. The total receipts, which have not yet been figured up, are expected to exceed last year's Charity Day, and the whole affair will serve to prove that "Curlers are never short."

"If the number of votes polled in the affirmative by a majority of the total votes polled at the election, and amount to at least forty per cent. of the total number of registered voters upon the revised list of electors, taken for the purpose of the General Election of members of the House of Assembly, held in the year 1913, the Governor in Council shall issue a proclamation prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors into or in this Colony at any time after the first day of Jan. 1917."

The publication of the above Section should settle the matter in dispute; is so far as intelligent people are concerned.
