Late Canadian News And Secretary Blaine Says Negotiations for Reciprocity Are Not To Be Reopened Now.

Be Reopened Now.

In regard to the alleged mission of Canadian politicians to Washington, a dispatch says: There seems to be a serious difference of opinion as to the report from Ottawa that the Canadian Ministers are to come to Washington at the request of the United States Government to consider reciprosity. Certainly the President has not invited them, and the Dominion Ministers will soon learn, if they do not know it now, that the President is the Government. A close friend of Secretary Blaine's said to-day that there was absolutely no truth in the report that negotiations on this subject are to be resumed in about a fortnight. He added: "The situation has not changed essentially since the President and Mr. Blaine postponed their not changed essentially since the President and Mr. Blaine postponed their conference with Sir Charles Tupper and the other British envoys. Secretary Blaine has never been convinced that the Conservative Cabinet, now headed by Premier Abbott, was sincere in desiring to secure reciprocal trade relations. He has there reciprocal trade relations. He has therefore, as his friends express it, refused to assist the Conservative Cabinet in deceiving the Canadian people by encouraging the pretense of negotiations which could not be fruitful. If another proposition should be made by the British Minister upon the subject the reply would be polite, but would virtually amount to a refusal to treat further under existing conditions. Secretary Blaine would be more ready to welcome a proposition coming from the Liberal party if it were in power in Canada, because he has always the assurances of their leaders that they favored a broad and generous policy of reciprocal trade relations."

when he says we make from \$10 to \$15 a
week. Now, I say there is not a half dozen
shoemakers in the city making those wages
and the majority of them don't average \$7. and the majority of them don't average \$7 a week the year round. Talking about the bill of wages paid in London this smart genius knows nothing at all about it. He says there are three wholesale shee factories says there are three wholesale shoe factories in thecity. Now, I say there are only two one is Sterling Bros., and the other is Stevens, Clarke & Stevens. The first named factory manufacture nothing but pegged and rives work. All the other lines they buy from other places, and the other factory (Stevens & Clarke) manufacture all the work they sell. The Rochester wages are not paid in this city, only on hands and turns. I will give you a few names of the London shoemakers that have gone to the United States to work and have all got a good job: H. Hunter M. Kelley, T. O'Connor, J. O'Connor and C. O'Connor, good job: H. Hunter M. Kelley, T. O'Connor, J. O'Connor and C. O'Connor, F. Friendship, James Friendship, F. Morrison, C. Colby, J. Pudney, F. Sullivan, J. Hamilton, James Harris, W.
