THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

Toronto, Nov. 2-11 a.m.—The depression
which was in Manitoba on Friday evening de-

Janaschek To-Night.

This evening Madame Janaschek will
produce Shakespeare's grand tragedy,
"Macbeth," at the Opera House, supported
by her splendid company. London theater-
goers have had some chance to see Janas-
schek and judge her representations, which
have always been of the highest order. Her
acting furnishes a most satisfactory ex-
ample of what may be expected from the
stage in its best estate. It is the finished
result of fine natural aptitude, developed
by years of conscientious study and assid-
uous practice. It abounds in intellect, in
vitality, in grace, in humor and in pathos,
and in so natural that the keenest observer
fails to discern the device by which the il-
lusion is effected. Performances such as
given by Janaschek form red letters in the
history of the stage, and show to what a
point of dramatic acting can be brought
when it is intrusted to those who regard
their profession as something intended for
the edification and instruction of their fel-
lows.

"The Dear Irish Boy."

To-morrow and Wednesday evening
lovers of Irish plays will have an oppor-

the Emerald Isle. The Chicago
Journal, "because its leading character is
not a young, good-looking, green singing
and graceful dancing and sweet stockinged
fellow, with plenty of Irish in his veins."
Clutchey is the name of the star character,
and Mike is not the kind of fellow one
would care to be associated with. He isn't
the dear Irish boy. The play is composed
of a series of dramatic sketches, and
comedy scenes which follow each other in
rapid succession. There's a murder, ac-
cusations, persecutions, and a sprinkling
of good dancing and singing, the whole
forming an interesting entertainment. Gus
Reynolds assumes the role of McClutchey
and does some effective work. George
Timmons, as a brave young Irish lad who
loves a pretty girl, has been playing Ollie
Evans makes a burlesque Colleen, who is
clever and graceful in dances.

Opening of All Saints' Mission.

The new All Saints' Mission Chapel on
the Hamilton road, that thing which was
published in the ADVERTISER of a
previous issue, was opened yesterday by
Rev. Canon J. B. Richardson. In spite of
the inclement weather a large congregation
was present, and the opening passed off
most successfully. The text for the
morning sermon was Genesis, xxviii.,
17: "This is the gate of heaven."

The chapel was wonderfully filled, a second
time in the afternoon, when the Bishop of
Huron preached from II Timothy, ii., 19:
"Nevertheless the foundation of God
standeth sure." In the course of his ser-
mon he explained the meaning of the
mission, and the knowledge that was trans-
ferring in the hearts of his creatures.

He congratulated the parishioners upon the
fitness and completeness of their chapel,
and expressed the hope that Christ alone
might ever be the foundation of all the
preaching and teaching in it. Rev. Richard-
son, of St. Paul's Cathedral, officiated at
the services in the evening, speaking from
II Samuel, vii., 2: "See now I dwell in a
house of cedar, but the ark of God dwelleth
within the curtains." The mission starts
out with a bright prospect, having been
organized but three years ago. Its growth
from its inception has been satisfactory,
but it is thought that the erection of their
mission chapel will give it a greatly increased
impetus for the coming year.

Sermon to Orangemen.

Rev. W. McDonagh, of the London
West Methodist Church, preached the an-
nual sermon to the Orangemen of No. 1
district yesterday afternoon. The brethren,
consisting of members of Lodges Ahogill,
No. 230; Hackett, No. 805; and Boyne,
No. 298 met at the Orange Hall, where the
annual sermon was formed under the com-
mand of District Master W. Brodison, and
led by the file and drum band of Ahogill
Lodge, they marched over to the church.

The center pews were reserved for them,
and when they arrived a fairly large con-
gregation was already seated on the sides.
After welcoming the Orangemen as fellow
lodgers men, the preacher prefaced his
sermon with a few eulogistic sentences for
the order of which, he said, he was and
ever would be proud to claim fellowship
with an order which, he said, was bound
by oath to forbear with the
ignorance of others. He selected as his
text the words from Jeremiah ix., 3:
"Valiant for the truth." In his opening re-
marks he dwelt upon the appreciation
which was always shown for bravery ex-
hibited in defense of right, and inquired
how fond people were of talking of valiant
men who had endured hardship or perished
in defense of their country. As an explana-
tion of what truth was the speaker took
the Bible as an illustration. It was, he
said, the truth because it presented the true
relationship between God and man, whether
the man was a sinner or a saint. The Bible,
he said, was one revelation upon another,
from the time of the creation of the world
down to the time of Christ. It was direct
from God and contained none of the per-
versions or traditions of men. There were
no divisions in it. It was written in the

Telephone War in Peterboro.

The local company which was formed in
Peterboro with a capital of about \$8,000,
and with the avowed intention of doing
business at half the rates charged by the
Bell Telephone Company, and paying a
much larger dividend to the shareholders,
of the Bell Telephone Company ever
received, has apparently discovered after
all its construction work has been done
that the big company has not the slightest
intention of giving up the field to it. The
tactics pursued by the first-comers are
simple in the extreme. They have waited
until the little company had spent what
was supposed to be the amount of its
capital, and now announce that they will
give all their old subscribers, who are not
interested as shareholders in the attempt to
wreck their business, and all new sub-
scribers who are likely to remain with them,
free telephone connection as long as the
opposition lasts. The officials of the Bell
Company say this attack on them is a
wholly unprovoked one, as no complaints
were made of the service in Peterboro, which
was excellent, and the regular rates charged
by them are the lowest in the world
for exchanges of the size; and also that
anyone who will take the trouble to
make a few inquiries could find out in five
minutes that the item of rent and salaries
is not a necessary part of the proper conduct
of the business would alone eat up all the
revenue of a cheaper-rate company, leaving
nothing whatever for the equally necessary
expenses of heating, lighting, stationery,
in fact on cost of construction and allow-
ance for depreciation, accidents and dam-
ages, and last, but not least, repairs. In
addition to ordinary repairs—a heavy and
continuous expense—one good storm will
often do damage enough to use up the
surplus revenue of a single agency for
years.

"The Shavers Have Been Here."

Never was such a place as Russia for
eccentric and mysterious creeds. The
peasants in the governmental province of
Ulm have been disquieted for some months
past by the appearance of a new religious
sect. Although no man has yet seen with
his own eyes an individual member of this
sect, its extraordinary doings have filled
mass a village with panic. The "shavers"
—or "Shearers," as they are properly
called—carry on their mad work at night
and in secret. Thus the inhabitants of a
village discover early in the morning that
all their fowls have been plucked of their
feathers, all their sheep closely shorn and
the horses have had their manes and tails
cut off.

The hair, wool and feathers thus gained
are made into a sacrificial pile and burned
in an open place in the road. In village
after village the cry has been raised: "The
shavers have been here!" The advent of
the "shavers" was foretold, they say, by
the appearance of a "besom" (a comet)
in the heavens. The peasants are persuaded
that the "shavers" are inspired by an evil
spirit, and that the object in making these
burnt sacrifices is that the ashes, blown
about by the wind, may scatter the seeds
of the plague through the country. [Fall
Mail Gazette.]
