The London Collegiate Institute's Enviable Position,

As Shown by the Report of Provincial Inspector Hadgson.

Heavy Hack Hire-Night Schools-To Change the Name of a School.

The Board of Education held another short session last night, completing the business by 9 o'clock. High School Inspector Hodgson presented a report on his recent inspection of the Collegiate Insti-tute, which reflects very creditably on Principal Merchant, his efficient staff and the school board as well. The school grounds, buildings, class rooms, halls, waiting rooms, teachers' private rooms, desks, blackboards, lighting, heating and ventilation were rated first class, but the closets were rated third class, as they are inadequate for the largely increased attendance. The equipment of the institute was thoroughly satisfactory; every subject on the programme was taught; the division of duties and ratio of pupils to teachers are satisfactory, and the character of the teaching of English classics, drawing, mathematics, French and German, reading, science and commercial were first class. The drill, calisthenics and gymnastics were rated at third. The concluding statement

"It affords me pleasure to report that the institute is in an exceedingly efficient condition. As I remarked in speaking to the pupils, it is in my opinion second to none in the Province.'

The report was sent to Nos. 1 and committees. No. 2 committee's report recommended the payment of several accounts and the

japanning of the deck roof of the Collegiate Institute. Trustee Greenlees called attention to an account of \$14 for hose ordered without instructions from the board or any committee, and which, he said, had not appeared in the accounts. He understood that trustees were expected to order goods only in case of emergency, and then not to any amount exceeding \$10. He heard that the chair-

man was the offender this time. Mr. MacRobert said his reason for ordering the goods was a proper one, He had been at Aberdeen school and found that the

hose was absolutely necessary. It turned out that the item was included in the accounts. It was recommended that A. Westman be paid \$24, and this covered

the \$14 bill for the hose. Mr. Powell brought a matter up which had never reached the columns of the newspapers before. Principal Graham, of Simcoe street, reported that a satisfactory arrangement had been made for the model school. The principal's room has been set apart for the special use of model students, 32 in number. It was more convenient for the principal to be at the school all the time. Referred to No. 1 committee.

recommended for payment by the audit committee. Trustee Wilkins gave notice of motion that the name of Askin street school be changed to Victoria.
