battle When the British and Egyptians landed the entire force retreated southward. The capture of the place was hailed with delight by the natives, who have long been harried by the Dervishes. They shouted, danced and sang in a frenzied manner, and hailed the expedition as their deliverers.

SIX HUNDRED KILLED. Constantinople, Sept. 21. - Details received here regarding the massacre at Egin, in the villayet of Kharput, show that it occurred on the 15th and 16th of the present month. The Kurds attacked the Armenian quarter, killed a large number of the inhabitants, and pillaged and burned their houses. Many Armenians escaped to the mountains.

According to the accounts of the Turkish Government, six hundred Armenians were killed at Egin, and these advices also state that the outrage was provoked by the Armenians firing into the Turkish quarter. It is feared here that the bloodshed at Egin is the beginning of a fresh series of massacres in Armenia.
