FAIR, VERY WARM, FOLLOWED

BY RAINS.

Toronto, May 30.—11 p.m.—The pressure continues highest over the South Atlantic States, and there are shallow depressions over the Province of Quebec and to the westward of the Mississippi, the latter accompanied by an extensive rain area extending to Michigan. The weather today has been intensely hot over the greater part of Ontario; elsewhere more moderate.

The minimum and maximum temperatures reported for today are: Edmonton, 26-60; Calgary, 26-60; Prince Albert, 22-74; Winnipeg, 24-70; Parry Sound, 56-82; Toronto, 64-80; Montreal, 60-88; Quebec, 50-82; Chatham, N. B., 46-78; Halifax, 46-60.
