

POWER OF SUN ON LARCE BUILDINGS

The Washington Monument Moves Perceptibly on a Hot Day.

The problems confronting architects have increased greatly in recent years ecause of the upward tendency of big business buildings. Beauty of form and convenience of arrangement are now of less importance than great strength to resist the strains which very tall structure must meet. Every time a cyclone has oc-curred in the west there has been speculation as to what would occur a big wind storm visited the ness district of New York. Archi ects and engineers have anticipated this possibility. They have considered also the effect of the sun's heat on great buildings, because observations have shown that on a hot day these sun as though shrinking from its heat: ile on a cold day the marble is rent by the freezing of the winter rain in sures made by the expansion of the marble in midsummer.

These effects are not so noticeable in New York as they are in some other cities, because New York streets are narrow, and the tall building are so ose together that they protect each ther from the sun.

It is wholly unpro-tected from the elements.
