BOER RESISTANCE BROKEN. London, Monday, May 14-4 a.m.-The war is practically over, says the Daily Chronicle's Kroonstad correspondent, and in less definite terms this is the view to be gathered from all the correspondents. They picture the Boers as utterly demoralized and disheartened by Lord Roberts' unexpected rapid advance and by his facile turning of carefully prepared positions of the Boers. There was practically no fighting and there are no further details to give respecting the occupa-tion of Kroonstad than are supplied in Lord Roberts' dispatch.

THE "OLD FLAG FLIES" OVER

KROONSTAD. The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: "The Union Jack was hoisted in the market place by Mrs. Lockhead, the American wife of a Scotchman. Most of the horses of the Boers are in a wretched condition, but President Kruger declares he will continue the war. It appears that the Boers at Kroonstad had been reinforced by

5.000 MEN FROM NATAL last Friday, and that altogether 10,000 men with 20 guns, trekked from Kroonstad on the approach of Lord Roberts. The Boers made an ineffectual stand at Boschrand and had elaborate entrenchments in front of Kroonstad, which offered great facilities for a rear guard action. Their only anxiety, however, appears to have been to get away safely with all their guns and convoys, which again they have successfully accomplished. The 78½ Dundas street, London. received the following dispatch from Gen. Roberts: "Kroonstad, May 12, 2 p.m.-I entered Kroonstad at 1:30 without opposition today, when the Union Jack was hoisted amid cheers from the few British residents.

"President Steyn fled last evening after vainly endeavoring to persuade the burghers to continue opposing us. The Transvaalers said they would no longer fight on Orange Free State soil, and made off for the Vaal River. Free Staters accuse the Tranvaalers of having made use of them and then deserting. Many of the Free Staters

have gone to their homes.

"The procession on entering the town was headed by a body guard, all of whom were colonials, and after my staff and foreign officers came the North Somerset Imperial Yeo-many, followed by Pole-Carew's division, consisting of the Guards and the 18th Brigade Navals, the 83rd, 84th and 85th Batteries, two five-inch guns manned by the Royal Artillery Com-pany, and the Twelfth Engineers. The

FREE STATE OPPOSITION OVER. Opposition in the Free State is practically over. All the prisoners in the hands of the British here agree that the quarrel between the Free Staters and the Transvaalers is so acute that the Transvaalers have decided to leave their ailies, whom they accuse of cowardice and lack of patriotism. Most of the Transvaal prisoners think if they are defeated at the Vaal River the Boers will retreat to Pretoria, but there appears to be a growing distrust in the Transvaal government. In a word, the back of the Boer resistance seems to have been broken. burghers are fighting without their previous stubbornness. They seem ready to retreat on the slightest pretext. Now comes word that a strong flying column composed of 3,000 cavalry and infantry, and a battery of six guns, passed through Vryburg on Wednesday, and was proceeding by forced marches night and day in the

direction of Mafeking.

The British are undoubtedly counting on reports that the Boers recently took away the heavy guns from before Mafeking, and also that the investing force is composed of old men. Some experts predict a heavy battle before the town is relieved. Some incline to the opinion that the Boers will withdraw as they did at Ladysmith, We-pener and Bloemfontein, and allow the
