A FATAL KICK

Young Sarnia Man Meets Instant
Death—Serious Accident at Petrolia.

KILLED INSTANTLY.

Sarnia, Sept. 5.—A sad accident occurred on the Sarnia and Florence road, a short distance from the town, yesterday, by which a young man, George Howser, lost his life. Young Howser took charge of George Davidson's team and commenced drawing gravel on the road. Arriving at the dumping place he had a short walk, and in stopping to pick up his lines got kicked in the head by one of the horses, and knocked down. The team started and brought the wagon loaded with gravel over his face, and death was instantaneous. Deceased was an estimable young man and was aged 19 years.

BAD ACCIDENT AT PETROLIA.

Petrolia, Ont., Sept. 5.—Yesterday morning about 11 o'clock a young man named Wm. Horne met with a bad accident. He was working on the drilling rig of Mr. Edwards, when a large piece of timber gave way and struck Horne on the back of the head. Very small hopes are entertained for his recovery.

SECTION MAN KILLED.

Napanee, Ont., Sept. 5.—Wilson Thompson, one of the section men working on the Grand Trunk, was struck and killed by No. 5 express, going east, yesterday, at noon. As the section gang were working on the track and saw the train approaching they all stepped off the track, Thompson included, but for some inexplicable reason, just before the train reached the men, Thompson, stepped right in front of the train, which struck and killed him instantly. Deceased leaves a wife and family.

NATURAL GAS AT HEPWORTH.

Hepworth, Sept. 5.—While drilling here for oil at a depth of 1,500 feet, a strong vein of natural gas was struck. The pressure at first only tested 85 pounds to the square inch, but has increased during the last three days to nearly 200 pounds. Drilling cannot be continued at present, owing to the great gas pressure. The company have about 4,000 acres of land in the neighborhood, but owing to the strike are unable to get any more. A number of strangers were trying to get options, but the excitement is so great. The drillers are confident that oil in large quantities will be got at less than 2,000 feet.
