A sensation was caused in diplomatic circles here today, when it became known that the United States, through Secretary of State Hay, had sent a note to the Russian and Chinese Governments following closely along the lines of the Anglo-Japanese treaty of Jan. 30. The note is interpreted as a permit the integrity of the empire to urday. be molested in favor of one nation to the detriment of another. The note practically indorses the English treaty with Japan, and says:

"An agreement whereby China gives clusive right or privilege of opening mines, establishing railroads, or in any ther way industrially developing Manchuria, can but be viewed with the gravest concern by the Government of he United States.

"It constitutes a monopoly which is a distinct breach of the stipulations of the treaties concluded between China and foreign powers, and thereby seriously affects the rights of American

"It restricts their rightful trade, exposing it to being discriminated against, interfered with or otherwise jeopardized, and strongly tends to permanently impairing China's sovereign rights in this part of the empire, while it seriously interferes with her ability to meet her international obligations. ers for similar equal extensive advantages elsewhere in the Chinese empire and the inevitable result must be complete wreck of the policy of absolute equality of treatment to all nations respecting trade, navigation and commerce within the empire's con-

"On the other hand, the attainment by one power of such exclusive privileges for the commercial organiza-tions of its nationality conflicts with the assurances repeatedly conveyed to this government by the imperial Russian ministry of foreign affairs of the imperial government's intention to follow the policy of the open door, as advocated by the government of the United States and accepted by all the treaty powers having commercial interests in the empire.

"It is for these reasons that the government of the United States now as in the incipient revolution. # MOVEMENTS RESTRICTED Perfumes...

Though the Boers Are Not Yet Cooped Up.

Kitchener's Blockhouse System Overcomes Difficulties of Distance.

Statement of British Casualties Since the South African Campaign Begun-Advice to Kruger.

London, Feb. 20 .- A dispatch to the Times from Bank Kop, in the Eastern Transvaal, says the Boers are very timid, keeping on the alert and beyond striking distance of the British. The condition of the prisoners | indicates much distress among the burghers. Lord Kitchener's gradual extension of the system of blockhouses is overcoming the difficulties of distance. The Boers are not yet cooped up, but their movements are restricted. The Boers released the Scots Grays who had been made prisoners.

#### STIR IN WALL STREET

Occasioned by President Roosevelt's Instructions Re Northern Securities Company.

New York, Feb. 20.-There was a sensational flurry in the stock market this morning which proved how disagreeable a surprise President Roosevelt had given the speculative world by his instructions to the attorneygeneral to begin proceedings to test the legality of the formation of the Northern Securities Company. The stocks of the trans-continental rail-ways bore the chief brunt of the process of unloading stocks, as they are most immediately concerned in the project represented by the formation of the company. Great Northern preferred is the only

stock still listed on the exchange which is immediately involved in the company, and the first sale of that was 51/2 lower than last night. U. P. St. Paul, Northwest and Southern Pacific all dropped sharply, Union Pacific losing 31/8, St. Paul 3 and Southern Pacific 25/8. But the weakness was by St. Paul preferred, Wheeling and Lake Erie first preferred, Northwestern, Illinois Central, Wabash preferred, Consolidated Gas and General Electric dropping from 2 to 31/2. The leading stocks all made their low prices at the start, and supporting orders carried them up between one and two points. Tennessee Coal made the extreme rally of 24, but the Pacifics, Readings, sugar and the tractions were all prominent in the upturn. St. Paul, however, only made a small recovery, and western stocks generally lagged. Quick profits were taken by the traders later, and there was a general set-back on
