"If the sport can be regulated so that sparring exhibitions may be given purely for the athletics then I have no objections, but plugfights, alleged prizefighters, swindlers and fakirs, must be barred, or else there can be no exhibitions of any sort. SELLERS' CHRISSE GOT THIRD MONEY ATHLETICS FAIRLY SURE OF THE FLAG

London Horse Did Not Finish Worse Than Third in Seven Heats.

Ingersoll, Oct. 5.—The speeding contests at the first day of the Ingersoll fair today were the best in the history of the society. The new half-mile track, just completed, is one of the best in Western Ontario and was no doubt a drawing card for many of the horsemen.

The first event was an "old man" race and was won by John Bell, driving Silver Star. The conditions were that the combined ages of the horse and driver should be 90 years. In one case the age of horse and driver was 94 years.

The farmers' race was won by Young Corn, with Clipper second.

The 2:24 pace was the event of the afternoon. Six horses started and seven heats were necessary to finish the race.

The first four heats were won by as many horses. Molly W. won first money. She took the third heat, second in the fourth, and fifth and first in the sixth and seventh. Roy Medium was first in the fourth and fifth heats.

A large number of horses are here for tomorrow's races, and it is expected that the events will be as interesting as today's.

London's Strong Line-Up For Game With the Tigers

Interest in tomorrow's Rugby game between London and the Tigers is tense today. The match is the opening of the season, and it promises to be a splendid exhibition. The much-heralded Tigers, of Hamilton, play the local senior team in Tecumseh Park.

The team that will represent London will be a big improvement upon that of last year. Under the guidance of Coach Smith, who, by the way, will play quarter, many new plays have been learned, which will prove puzzlers for the Tigers. The signal system is entirely new and as different from the 18-11-24 of last year as black is from white.

But five of last year's men will be on the line-up. Cal Brown, Edy and Given on the wing line, and Rice and MacMahon on the half. The other wings, Rau and Vining are two men who play much after Given's style. Vining works like a Trojan, and is a very hard man to hold. Frank White will play outside wing tomorrow. He played with the intermediate champions a few years ago, is a fast runner and splendid tackle. Morrison at center will more than make good. Smith will take MacMahon's place at quarter. MacMahon is a fast runner, and will have a better opportunity to distinguish himself at half.

The back division is by far stronger than that of last year. Not a good punter was on the team in 1904. With difficulty, it seemed, the ball was kicked over the heads of the wings. But with Clark and Hueston, this end of the game is in good hands. Clark is an ex-Winnipeg player, and was captain of the team there. He will play center half. Hueston's ability is well known. So is Captain Bice's.

Many think the Tigers an infallible bunch of players. On their own grounds last year the local team held them down for one-half of the game to the score of 11-10, and tomorrow they are confident of giving them a defeat.

A large crowd will be on the grounds to see the game. Every person interested in a manly contest should not fail to witness this one. Black and white are the London club's colors.

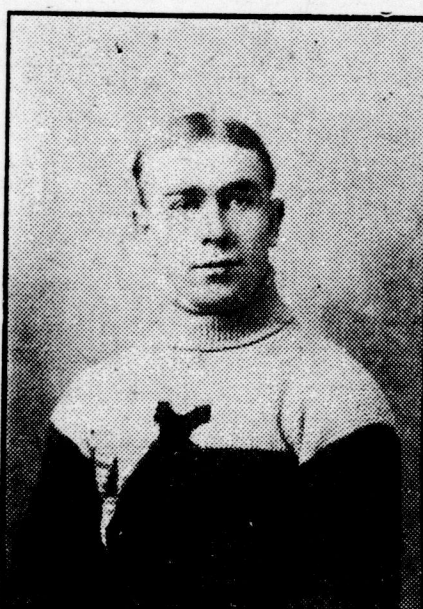

Some of the Star Tigerse Will Not Be On the Lin

A special from Hamilton to The Advertiser says: The team that the Tigers will take to London tomorrow will not likely be as strong as the one that won the O. R. F. U. championship last year, and the players are not so confident of winning as they were a year ago. Neither McKean nor Burkholder will be on the line, both having retired from the game. They will be greatly missed, as they were hard workers, brainy players and good tacklers. Dumoulin will be back in his old position at center half, but he will not be the "Du" of old, for the reason that he is not in shape. Owing to illness he was unable to attend the practices early in the season, and the only work-out that he has had was yesterday. With these exceptions the team will be practically the same as it was last year. Having the advantage of playing on the home grounds, the London twelve should stand an excellent chance of winning, if they are anything like as strong as reported. The Tigers' team will be:

PACED ANOTHER MILE IN 1:56; DAN PATCH EQUALED HIS RECORD

Could Not Lower His Mark—Ethel's Pride Takes a Big Stake in Straight Heats.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 5.—Ethel's Pride, the favorite, today won the classic Transylvania Stake in straight heats. It was the seventeenth renewal of this race. There were nine starters.

In the first heat Turley finished second, close up. Goers, driving Turley, did not make his drive until too late. In the second heat Ethel's Pride took the lead and held it. Turley could not overtake her and finished second, with John Caldwell coming last. In the stretch, and finished a good third.

Ethel's Pride led by a length all the way in the third heat. Mainland made a gallant struggle, and all but beat the Dictum mare in a heart-breaking finish.

Ethel's Pride is owned by John Shepherd, of Boston, and was driven by J. Andrews. The stake was worth \$5,000.

Bonalet had no trouble in winning the 3-year-old pacing futurity. Miss Kenney and J. P. have each two heats in the first division of the 2:18 trot, which was continued.

The second division of the 2:18 trot was won by Mainland, in a jog. Dan Patch, the world's champion pacer, equalled his record of 1:56 today and also broke the track record for the fastest mile ever trotted or paced over it. He was driven by H. C. Hearsey, and his fractional time was: 29, 58, 1:27, 1:56.

Despite the fact that he was carrying top weight, 126 pounds, Broomstick was considered to be so far outclassing Sailor Boy and Louis H. that he was held at a prohibitive price.

ATTACKED UMPIRE.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 5.—Second Base—man Ferris, of the Boston team, is in a good way to lay off for the remainder of the season as the result of an encounter with Umpire Connolly in Tuesday's game against Cleveland. In the fourth inning Ferris was called out on strikes and undertook to criticize the umpire, for which he was ordered out of the game. He was informed the umpire after the game and jammed him against the fence in front of the grandstand, and in response to the admonition of the umpire not to make trouble for himself, proposed to punch the official's head, and do it then. Trouble was avoided, but the umpire undoubtedly says that President Johnston was posted on the proceeding.

BATEMAN WOULD NOT PROSE.

Des Moines, Oct. 5.—Upon the signing of a sworn statement by Harry Q. Bateman, the Milwaukee first baseman, who was stabbed by Catcher Charles Dexter, Monday night, refusing to prosecute, Dexter was released from jail this morning. Bateman, in his statement, says he does not care to prosecute, his injuries being of a minor nature. He expects to leave the hospital within a few days. Dexter will go to Chicago tonight. The grand jury may act on the case in spite of Bateman's refusal to prosecute.

TEDDY JUN. ON THE GRIDIRON.

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 5.—Theo-

dore Roosevelt, jun., is rapidly becoming one of the best of the Harvard Freshmen who are trying to land a position on the Harvard first-year football team. The President's son gets out on the field for practice every day.

On the gridiron young Roosevelt's play is strenuous. He falls on the ball with an earnestness that warms the heart of the Freshman coach. The four years that young Teddy put in playing end on the football team at Groton now stands him in good stead, and he is not as awkward in his movements as the rest of the youngsters. SCANDAL WILL BE SIFTED TO BOTTOM

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 5.—As a result of disclosures made by Billy Nolan, Nelson's manager, to District Attorney Seymour and the grand jury of Sacramento County, the attorney is satisfied he has a strong case against the producers of the fund used to kill the Ralston anti-prize fight bill at the last session of the Legislature and will keep the grand jury in session at Sacramento until he has sifted the matter to the bottom. This is independent of the threatened disclosures of Fayette Mitchell, assemblyman from Palo Alto, who claims to have information about the money used to kill the bill.

Nolan told the grand jury he had been told by Harry Corbett that \$1,000 would be held out of Nelson's forfeit money as his assessment for the fund used for protecting prize fight interests in the Legislature. Nolan declared that when Corbett first proposed to him to contribute to this fund he flatly refused.

Eddie Graney probably will be called to Sacramento to tell what he knows about the collection of a fund. Among the things stated by Nolan was that Graney said during a discussion of the action of Corbett: "Why, they tried to hold me up for \$300."

The board of supervisors has failed to award a permit for a professional boxing contest this month in San Francisco. As a result, Managers Greggains and Coffroth are up in the air. Greggains has Kaufman ready to fight Jack Jeffries or Schreck. He also has a Nell-Tenny return match. Coffroth has no matches made, but has a number of good men ready.
