BRILLIANT ORGANIZATION IS THE BAND OF THE GRENADE GUARDS

Gives Two Concerts at Princess Rink That Delighted Londoners.

After hearing the concerts of the famous Grenadier Guards Band at the Princess rink yesterday afternoon and evening, it was the unanimous opinion of the large audiences present that in point of technical excellence, rhythm and tone quality, this aggregation is superior to any other similar organization that has visited the city. Conductor Lieut. Williams has gathered a concert band of 61 instrumentalists, and in both ensemble and solo work one immediately recognized a musical distinction. There is an entire absence of that blare and crash in concert numbers that is characteristic of so many military bands. The overture from "Tannhauser," given at the afternoon performance, has never been more brilliantly rendered, even by the great orchestras. The selection from "Cavalleria Rusticana," too, with beautiful and world-famous intermezzo, was a supreme joy to the ear. Besides the two numbers already mentioned, the matinee concert included selections from "H. Trovatore," a Fantasia on Songs arranged by Hartmann, and "The

of darkey life. Messrs. Gay and Bullock, cornet and piccolo soloists, performed brilliantly, stamping themselves genuine in the handling of their particular instruments. The accompanying effects were charming. As a tribute of respect to the late Bishop of Huron, Conductor Williams opened the afternoon concert with Chopin's Funeral March, the audience standing throughout its rendition. At the evening concert the band continued and deepened the impression produced at their first appearance. The first item on the programme was that dashing march, "The Old Dessauer," one of Conductor Williams' compositions. The selections from Gounod's masterpiece, "Faust," were magnificently performed, and displayed the band's command of all varieties of measure and expression to perfection. After a piccolo solo splendidly executed by Mr. Bullock, came Tchaikovsky's overture, "Solonelle, 1812," written by the great Russian composer in commemoration of the retreat of Napoleon from Moscow. That the motif of the composer was fully appreciated by the band was evident in the opening passages, and the piece produced a distinct effect upon the audience. "Requiem" from Greig, and Liszt's "Second Hungarian Rhapsody," were also much enjoyed, the last named with its abandon, its rich coloring and gypsy passion, bringing a most flattering Plantation Sketch, a piece descriptive

JOTTINGS FROM NEAR-BY PLACES

THAMESFORD. Thamesford, Oct. 18.—A full account has already appeared in these columns regarding the Thamesford Fair, Suffice it here to say that it was on the whole a success. Owing to the unfavorable weather, the attendance was not so large as last year, but the exhibits were of excellent quality, and fully up to the mark. The trials of speed were well contested, and were the center of attraction on the field. The board will have a nice little surplus to apply to next year's fair. Much credit is due to the efficient secretary, Mr. E. B. McCarty, and the board of directors, who spared no effort to make the show a success.

The concert given in the town hall on fair night by the Hewer Concert Company, of Woodstock, was, from the standpoint of attendance, a decided success. The hall was filled to the doors, and many were not admitted, as the seats were standing room only. Notwithstanding the physical discomfort suffered in consequence of the intense heat and overcrowding of the hall, that good order which is characteristic of a Thamesford audience prevailed to a fair degree throughout. The programme was not up to the mark and was in some respects a disappointment. It was much discounted by the fact that many of the selections were old, a number of them being a repetition of those given by the same company last year. The part taken, however, by the Misses Schlunz and Mr. Albert Greenlaw, of Woodstock, was deserving of comment. The Misses Schlunz sang with splendid effect "Excelsior" and "Over the Hills and Far Away." These selections delighted the audience, and called for hearty encores. Mr. Greenlaw possessed a powerful bass voice, and although it was at a great disadvantage owing to the incapacity of the hall, yet gave a most excellent rendering of "The Holy City" and "King of the Forest." Mr. Greenlaw also sang "Walk to Philadelphia in the Morning" with a good deal of ease. He has a strong baritone voice which shows careful cultivation. Miss Hewer gave three selections. Mrs. M. Cooper and Miss J. McWilliams delighted the good-natured audience with two stirring instrumental pieces. The accompaniments were splendidly taken by Mr. M. Cooper. In the execution of which she displayed much skill, as she played entirely by sight. Mr. Hewer had a previous practice. She, however, always plays well. Mr. Hewer had on the stage one of his well-known Newcombe pianos, which added materially to the strength of the programme. The railway authorities are putting a branch line into the yard of the stage mill, so that the stages may more easily be loaded. NINE YEARS WITH COLORS

Important New Regulations Passed by British Army Council.

London, Oct. 21.—The British army council has issued an order, under which, instead of enlisting three years with the colors and nine in the reserve infantry of the line, will in future enlist for nine years with the colors and three in the reserves, thus practically abolishing the short-term system. War Secretary Arnold-Forster forehadowed this change in a speech last July, in which he declared that the existing system had proved a failure, because so few men volunteered to extend their services with the colors. Some critics, however, declare that the existing difficulty of obtaining recruits will be greatly enhanced, under the new order.
