

PROMOTION BY EVERYDAY WORK

Prof. Dutton Says Advancement
by Exams Is Not the Best
Method.



The regular semi-annual meeting of the City Teachers' Association was opened in the school room of the First Presbyterian Church yesterday. After an opening address by Rev. W. J. Clark, Prof. Dutton, the head of the Columbia University, was introduced.

"The Essential Factors of a Good School," was the subject on which he spoke. The most important factor of a school is the teacher, he said. A teacher should be good, well educated, with a love for the profession, and must be fond of children. The true ideal of teaching is leadership. If teachers will study the proper methods of instruction they will improve greatly.

The various conditions under which the teacher has to work are of great importance. Dirty, dusty, poorly-ventilated schoolrooms are sources from which a great deal of harm may arise. A school should be so constructed and so conducted that it will make the work of both teacher and pupils the most agreeable and interesting. Physical culture, in the form of exercises, games, drills, and dances, is very important. The schools should have as much variety in the work as possible.

The discipline of schools is another important question. Real discipline has its foundation in self-control. A pupil should be so governed as to develop his self-control.

Good teaching is also essential. Teaching should be a process of cooperation. A teacher should aim at working with the pupils, and in memorizing, which is very important. The thinking should come first, that is to say, that the meaning should be thoroughly understood before the memorizing is done.

Small class libraries are of great importance.

The form of examination used is important. Some examinations should be for thinking and memory power tests, and in these no books should be used, but there should be examinations in which books are used in order to test the investigating power of the pupils. So far as promotion by examination is concerned it is not a fair way. Promotion should depend upon everyday work, taken along with examination work.

After the lecture, a discussion took place, in which Professor Dutton took part.

At the afternoon session, Professor Dutton again lectured, his subject being "Education and the Higher Life." This lecture was a sequel to the former ones, and pointed out the relationship of religion to education.

LET SEWER CONTRACTS

Board of Works Held Short Meeting
Last Night.

The board of works held a short meeting last night before the meeting of the railway committee. Chairman Gerry, all the members, and Secretary Bell being present.

The board will buy a dump-cart for use on the asphalt pavement. The cart will be purchased from an Ohio firm.

The contract for the construction of a sewer on Queen street, from Dundas to King street, was awarded to Fred Harding, at \$45, and 25 cents a foot for side drains.

W. H. Gould secured the contract for the sewer on Dufferin avenue, east of English, at \$60, and 30 cents a foot for side drains.

The board is considering the advisability of experimenting with Westrinite on Queen street. It is claimed that Westrinite will lay all dust, and the owner of the patent guarantees to lay the dust on a mile of pavement at a cost of \$400 for one year. The agent of the company will be here in a week or so, when the experiment may be tried.

The board will prepare a skin-diamond for the East End Baseball League on Queen's Park. The cost will be very small.

WHITE GLOVES FOR JUDGE

Not a Criminal Case for the Spring
Assizes Next Week.

There is not a single criminal case to be tried at the spring assizes, which open on Tuesday next.

This is a most satisfactory state of affairs. While it would indicate that crime is on the decrease, there have been a number of cases within the past six months, but the cases have been disposed of by the county judges and police magistrates. Several prisoners have been sent to Kingston penitentiary, and a great many to the Central. Crime in the county has been very scarce, hardly a case of any importance having been reported for some time. This is due in a large measure to the fact that a very bad gang of Indians have been rounded up and put away.

Mr. Hume B. Elliot, of this city, was appointed crown prosecutor for this assize. The absence of any cases will mean a pair of white gloves for the presiding judge.

HOLIDAY TRAFFIC HEAVY

Travel on the Railroads Out of Lon-
don Is Brisk.

The railway business for the holidays has been very heavy, and from every road comes assurances that the receipts are heavier than usual. The splendid weather of yesterday gave people confidence in Old Probs, and many evening journeys they had looked upon as useless.

The traffic to Toronto and Detroit from London is unusually large. Intermediate points also gave their share of patronage.

Through trains are very heavily loaded for this season of the year, and everywhere the railroad men are very busy.

SETTLED OUT OF COURT

Two Interesting Cases Set for As-
sises Struck Off List.

Two cases which were set for hearing at the assizes next week, and which were of unusual interest, have been settled out of court.

Grace Henshaw was the plaintiff in one, and she was seeking damages from Wm. B. McFarlane, a West Nile court farmer, for alleged breach of promise of marriage.

In the other case, Miss Henshaw's father was the plaintiff, and he was asking damages for the alleged seduction of his daughter.

The damages sought in the two cases totaled \$5,000. The terms of the settlement have not been made public.

PUMPS ARE NOT SATISFACTORY; EXPERT TO REPORT UPON THEM

New Hydraulic Machinery, It Is
Said, Are Not Doing What
Is Expected of Them.

Chairman Darch and Water Commis-
sioner Saunders yesterday inspected the new hydraulic pumps at Springbank, in company with an expert mechanical engineer from the Canada Foundry Com-
pany, Toronto.

The expert has been engaged by the commission, with the consent of Superintendent Moore, to ascertain what is the matter with the pumps, and why they do not pump the quantity of water they are guaranteed to pump by the makers.

For some reason or other, ever since the new machinery was put in, a certain amount of dissatisfaction has existed.

It is said the pumps are supposed to have a capacity of 5,000,000 gallons daily, but the most that can be got out of them, according to a member of the commission, is about 3,500,000 gallons per day, and the past week less than 2,000,000 gallons per day has been the rule.

The pumps were made by the London Machine Tool Company, and it is said they are of a good type. It is also understood that they were passed by the commission, and that they have been paid for, with the exception of the sum of \$2,500, which has been held back for some time. They cost about \$25,000.

The company is naturally anxious to secure what is coming to it, and the claim is put forth that the machines are as good as any in use in America today.

Consequently the commission has secured the services of the expert, and his report will be presented in a few days.

It is said that were the pumps in proper working order the city could save about \$500 a year for fuel, as when the water power falls the steam pumps must be used, at a great cost for fuel.

Booth said this would be a good thing for the city.

"The report should go east," he said. "It's the logical place for it."

Wants Crews Left Here.

Ald. Booth brought up another point which he thinks should be considered when the agreement with the city is being drafted. He said the city should insist that all the train crews should be allowed to remain in London. Four years ago seven crews were removed to Sarnia. On Monday, March 26, the company started running the International Limited and Eastern Express from Toronto, instead of London, thereby reducing the train crews stationed here by four men. London is in the center of the middle division, and all crews should be stationed here. He declared the master mechanic's office should be in this city instead of in Toronto. If London was maintained by the company as the railway center it is entitled to be. It would mean that there would be 250 more trainmen here, or about 50 more train crews. These, with their families, would make a very acceptable addition to the city.

Mayor Judd said that the company was compelled to remove train crews from this city because of the lack of facilities here. When the improvements have been completed there will be no need to do this.

This matter will also be considered by the sub-committee.

PASTOR INDUCTED AT NEW ST. JAMES

Rev. Thomas H. Mitchell Takes
the Place of Rev. A. J.
MacGillivray.

Rev. Thomas H. Mitchell, B. D., was inducted into the pastorate of the New St. James' Presbyterian Church last evening in the presence of a large congregation.

Rev. Dr. Munro, formerly of Ridge-town, preached the sermon, taking as his text, Timothy II, 17, 18 and 19. These verses, he said, stood as it were for the seal which secured the safety of the church of God. He pointed out that seals might be used for three purposes, first, as a confirmation or guarantee that documents are true and genuine; second, to denote ownership; and it was in this relationship that the text applied to the church. A seal also has two sides, so with this scriptural seal, it had God's side or God's promise, and man's side or the conditions under which God's promise will hold good. Man's side was distinctly pointed out in the following text: "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life" and in, "Let everyone that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity." The only way to depart from iniquity is by the true use of God's word, by carrying religion into all our business politics and social life.

Rev. Mr. Lindsay, moderator of the presbytery, conducted the induction ceremony, after which Rev. Dr. Ross addressed the minister in a few appropriate words. After stating that he did not think it necessary to remind the pastor of the great responsibility he had shouldered, Dr. Ross complimented Mr. Mitchell on his splendid personal attributes and ability, and powers of intellect, speech, executive ability and the unanimity with which the congregation had called him to be their pastor.
