

"We thought the old days had gone when we had 33 years of Liberal rule. We thought they had learned, when they got into power, how to use it with discretion, but we have learned that they have not profited by that lesson. There was a time when we had what we called rebellion, and I say that in my opinion there was not at the time of the rebellion any one thing that gave more reason and more excuse for what occurred than what has been occurring in this Province in the last six nonths. There is no Liberal now who does not justify that rebellion. In those times we had a man in Lobo Township, Capt. Matthews, an upright and honorable man, who made himself offensive to the Conservatives then in lower, when at a concert given by a tranded Yankee opera company, he uggested, after it had sung the Naional Anthem, that it should play 'Yankee Doodle." He was ordered by the Conservatives to be tried in England for his 'offense.' But they do not do that now. They only send men to Toronto. (Laughter.) Capt. Matthews was comparatively well-to-do, but he was ruined by the persistent and illfounded attack of the Conservative Government of that time. Then there was Robert Gourlay, who because he ventured to criticise the Conservative administration of justice was hustled off from Niagara to Kingston for trial. The Conservatives thought they could get the right kind of a jury at Kingston. Next Brockville was tried, but Gourlay was again not convicted, and finally Toronto was tried (Laughter) and Gourlay was found guilty.
