side of politics who is not truly sorry, whether or not Mr. Hyman's resignation was brought about by illness or by certain so-called revelations at Toronto. There is no reason why London should be put to the trouble and expense of another election at this time, when we will have a general election within a short time. I do not believe the people of London desire a change in their representative. It will do no good to make a change. If the best man the other side can produce was elected, Hyman's defeat would be a loss to the city. (Cheers.)

"I have, therefore, much pleasure in nominating Hon. Charles S. Hyman, as member for London."

Nomination Greeted With Cheers.

The nomination was followed by another outburst of cheering, after which Mr. Purdon resumed. He told a story of a Scotchman in Edinburgh, who was buried under a pile of debris.

While the workers were attempting to dig him out, and thinking him dead, they suddenly heard a voice shout: "I have awa' lads; I'm no dead yet."

"The Conservative has been expressing the opinion that Hyman is dead in London, but they are now hearing the voice shout, 'Heave awa' lads.' It's the voice of Hyman, from California, who places himself in the hands of his friends of London and Ottawa. The pictures we see in the papers are not pictures of Hyman, the invalid, but of Hyman the cricketer, the athlete, fair and honorable to all men, that we know him to be. To me elections are much like good square they should not be conducted in the same spirit of fairness and good will. And under the leadership of that veteran cricketer, Mr. Hyman, the Liberals of London should conduct not only a fair, honorable fight, but a fight which will place C. S. Hyman at the head of the polls with a substantial majority. (Tremendous applause.)"

It is far worse to succeed by unfair means than to lose in a fair fight. "When we look at the history of London, there is much to cause us to take heart. Away back, whenever a time, when Dixon and Wilson contested the constituency, I am told the majorities were quite small—48 or 50. Then Sir John Carling came in the field about 1877, and from that time onward until C. S. Hyman became the Liberals' standard-bearer, the Liberals of London did not have a chance of winning. It is true that Col. Walker did wrest the seat from Mr. Carling on one occasion, but it was only for a while."

Hyman of Cabinet Timber.

"Not all men who are elected make good members of Parliament. London had, however, chosen Mr. Hyman as its representative, and the Liberals of this city had the satisfaction of knowing that their judgment had been endorsed by the House of Commons, which is a great place for young men. (Cheers.)"

Not only did Mr. Hyman prove himself a good member, but before his resignation, he had proved himself a good member of cabinet. He was made of cabinet timber, and when the Hon. James Sutherland took ill, Mr. Hyman was asked and consented to look after the department of public works. He continued in the post for two years, and then when death removed Mr. Sutherland, Mr. Hyman was offered the portfolio by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. This showed that he had filled the office faithfully and well. "Now, through certain causes, he is to go to the people again, even though it will only be for the remainder of the present term of the Government, which will amount to a year or so."

"Under the circumstances, I believe he will have the support of very many Conservatives of London, who fully realize that it will be in the interests of the city to re-elect Mr. Hyman to the House of Commons and to his position as minister of public works. (Cheers.) I do not believe there is any doubt that he will be returned in any event by a handsome majority. (Cheers.)"

"Under no government has Canada enjoyed such prosperity as she has enjoyed under Laurier. (Cheers.) Canada needs businessmen, more than politicians at present, and Mr. Hyman is the man who should be sent, and who will be sent to Ottawa. (Cheers.)"

"I am glad to hear that Mr. Hyman is getting better, and that he will be able to represent the city at Ottawa again." (Cheers.)

Mr. Purdon then referred to the election of Mr. Duncan C. Ross, in West Middlesex, and the cheers of the assembled Liberals shook the hall.

Higher Office in Store for Him.

"We have known Charlie Hyman, as a boy, as a union, as an alderman of the city of London, as mayor, as member of Parliament, as chairman of the railway committee, and as a cabinet minister, and we have every reason to feel proud of him. (Cheers.) He is now on a fair way to occupy the highest position in the power of Canadians to confer on him."

"It is quite true that it has been said he is not, and has not been, sick, but such ungenerous arguments will not bear fruit amongst the thinking people of London, of either shade of politics. Suppose the city of London voted over Mr. Hyman the best man the Opposition can produce, the city would be a loser by the change."

"No matter whom the Conservative might be, he would be compelled to sit in Opposition, and would have no influence with the Government. But I do not believe the citizens of London will turn down C. S. Hyman, the man who has been tried at all times and found true. I believe he will be again sent to Ottawa as one of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's most loyal and most trusted supporters." (Loud applause.)

Nomination Seconded.

Mr. Moses Masurel was called upon to second the nomination, and he was greeted with applause. Mr. Masurel said it gave him very much pleasure to second the nomination, and he added that it was his duty to elect Mr. Hyman as representative of London.

"It is my duty," declared the speaker, "Mr. Hyman cannot possibly be with us. What a great tribute it will be to him for us to go and elect him to our own free will in his absence. (Applause.) I remember when Mr. Hyman came to the front and brought the Liberals to the top in London. I remember the days when to be a Liberal in London was not popular. In those days we did not have any place to live in quarters and it is not popular to claim to be a Liberal."

"But we must organize and work. There are men today who are just as eager to defeat Mr. Hyman as they were a few years ago. The enemy are just as anxious as ever to defeat Liberals. We had evidence of it in the last municipal election, when Mr. Greenlee, Mr. Armstrong and even myself went down. (Laughter.)"

"I show you that the very same feeling, the very same party, that were wont to work against and stood against us 25 years ago, are alive today. The old spirit is there. They are ready to defeat us if they can. Don't let them do it. (Hear, hear.) I do not know of a greater compliment that you can pay Mr. Hyman than to elect him while he is on a sick bed in California, and unable to participate in the campaign. It is the least we can do to elect him by a good large majority." (Loud applause.)

Mr. J. M. McEvoy.

Before submitting the nomination to the meeting for approval, Mr. Gibbons called on a number of other speakers, first of whom was Mr. J. M. McEvoy, who stated in his opening remarks that, like others, he regretted the occasion which brought the Liberals together at this time. At the same time, he was very glad there were so many to assemble. One would have thought not many weeks ago, he said, that it had been announced that there was to
