Davidson Races Crispin Tomorrow For Championship of America

The World's Champion Trick
Skater To Meet the
Local Star.

John F. Davidson, conceded to be the world's champion trick and acrobatic skater, who began an engagement at the Jubilee Rink here last night, was at one time the champion professional cyclist of Canada. Davidson comes of a family of skaters and cyclists, of whom Harley, his brother, is perhaps best known, next to Jack. The Davidsons hail from Brantford. Jack Davidson has performed in all the big cities of both continents, and he is recognized as a splendid speed skater as well as a trick expert. Davidson dropped into The Advertiser office today and exhibited clips from the New York World and Journal, to the effect that he had broken the world's record for jumping on skates, by clearing the barrier at 3 feet 10 inches, in Madison Square Garden.

Last night Davidson gave exhibitions of trick and acrobatic skating, and tonight he will repeat the performance, and add to the programme.

To Race Crispin.
Tomorrow night Davidson and Crispin, the well-known local expert, meet in a mile match race at the Jubilee Rink, and inasmuch as the pair broke even at Toronto in a series of four races, this event can be looked upon as a rubber match.

Davidson stated today that he would like to arrange a series of races with Crispin in different rinks for side bets of from \$100 to \$300. He states that he is handicapped somewhat in being obliged to give exhibitions prior to a race, and expects to make Crispin travel tomorrow, nevertheless.

DETROIT TIGERS IN POOR FORM

Have Not Yet Struck Their
Gait and Naps Defeat
Them Six to Two.

Detroit, April 21.—And still the Tigers have not struck their gait. Yesterday Cleveland took them into camp again, 6 to 2. The game was a lifeless one, a result probably of the two days of idleness. The Tigers made errors as did the Naps, but were less fortunate in getting away with them.

They hit enough to win an ordinary game, but could not get men around the bases. Jennings gave the fans, numbering close to 6,000, who turned out enough to satisfy them in at least one way—he turned out Herman Malloy to the box and proved that he has still another colt pitcher ready for major league service.

The Central League recruit showed that with but a few finishing touches he will have all that any major league demands: He had speed, fine control, and curves that made the Napsland batter miss frequently by several feet.

He pitched a game good enough to win any contest, but there were no runs to help him along and ragged support hurt him.

He, himself, pulled off one bad fielding play, being wrongly coached, that put him in the hole. Not only did Herman look like a great find as a box artist, but also as a hitter. He stands at the plate well and lined them out. As proof of this, he made two pretty singles yesterday. The crowd took to his work from the start, and despite the fact that he was being beaten, he was roundly cheered.

Row Enlivens Game.
A row enlivened the game in the seventh, when Umpire Evans fired Terry Turner from the game. Turner tried to score when the ball got away from Schmidt, but was thrown out.

Turner's play and played a star game. The Naps opened the scoring and maintained their lead to the last, although frequently it looked as though the Tigers were about to start one of their usual rallies.

In the second they started when Rhodes walked. Josh Clarke bunted, and Schmidt tried to get an out at second. As a consequence, both men were safe. Bad Coaching.
In the fourth they got one tally. With one down, Schmidt and O'Leary both singled. Malloy came through with a drive to deep center and either bad coaching or his own inexperience made him try for second. Birmingham scored. Malloy popped to Turner and the chance was gone.

The fifth saw the Naps pull away again. Josh Clarke looked like an infant against Malloy's curves, missing three of them. Bradley drove one at Coughlin that got away from Bill Stovall followed with a single to left. Lajoie bunted one to Malloy, who was coached to throw to second. It was a bad play, as Stovall was almost there. Malloy threw hurriedly and the ball bounded past Schaefer on the ground. Bradley scored and Stovall made third. Brother George scored after Turner had walked, when Nig Clarke grounded to Schaefer.

Schaefer opened the Tiger half of his round with a clean drive over second. In the out of Crawford and Cobb advanced him to Crawford and Rossman's hit to left. Coughlin followed with another single, but Schmidt rolled to Lajoie. After that Rhodes held the champions safe.

In the seventh Bradley doubled and with two out Turner did likewise, scoring him. On a passed ball Terry tried to score. Schmidt threw to Malloy at the plate just as Turner slid. Evans called him out and the row started. Terry was ordered out of the game and Nill was sent in to take his place.

AFTER WESTON'S RECORD

Young New England Frenchman Footing It From Portland to Chicago.

Newburyport, Mass., April 21.—Arsene Beaudin, of Adams, Mass., who started from Portland at midnight on Sunday to walk to Chicago in an effort to lower the record of Edward Payson Weston, arrived in Newburyport about 10 o'clock last night. The distance from Portland to this city is 77 miles. Beaudin was very tired upon reaching here, and fell asleep in a chair in a newspaper office, where he went to report his arrival. He announced, however, his intention of starting at 4 o'clock this morning to cover a stretch of 60 miles, which will take him twenty miles beyond Boston.

As Beaudin had no money, he did not go to a hotel, but was allowed to sleep at the police station. His arrival here was greatly in contrast with that of Weston. The latter was met by a crowd of people, who escorted him into the city, while the arrival of young Beaudin was practically unnoticed.

**STAHL AND DONLIN
ARE REINSTATED**
Cincinnati, April 20.—The National baseball commission today reinstated Players Garland Stahl and M. J. Donlin, but fined each \$100 for having participated in certain games with clubs or against clubs harboring ineligible players in the city of Chicago during last season. Because of the questions raised, the commission gives warning that in the future no national agreement player will at any time be permitted to play with or against any club harboring any ineligible player.

The commission announces that there is no objection on the part of the commission to players participating in exhibition games, either before or after the close of the season, in the respective leagues to which the clubs belong, that have title to them, but in no instance can they participate in games with clubs or against clubs harboring ineligible players.

**MORRISSEY WINS
BOSTON MARATHON**
Mercury A. C. Runner Covers
Twenty-five Miles in Remarkable Time.

Boston, April 20.—T. P. Morrissey, of the Mercury A. C., New York City, won the twelfth annual renewal to-day of the Boston Athletic Association's Marathon road race, covering the 26 miles from Ashland to the finish mark on Exeter street in two hours 25 minutes and 43.1 seconds.

The time is second only to the record of two hours, 24 minutes and 24 seconds, made last year by Tom Longboat, the Canadian Indian runner. Fifty yards behind Morrissey came J. J. Hayes, of the Irish-American A. C., New York, who in turn led Robert A. Fowler, of the Cambridgeport Gymnasium Association, by about the same distance. Hayes' time was 2:26:04, while Fowler took 2:26:42.

**HENRY CHADWICK
DIES SUDDENLY**
"Father of American Baseball" Passes Away in His Eighty-third Year.

New York, April 20.—Henry Chadwick, known as the "father of American baseball," died at his home in Brooklyn this afternoon after a brief illness with pneumonia. He was 83 years old.

Chadwick, who was known as "Top," was born in England 83 years ago. He attended the opening game this season at Washington Park, Brooklyn, between Brooklyn and Boston, and was given an ovation by players and spectators. He contracted a heavy cold, which developed into pneumonia. Heart failure set in, and, despite heroic measures, he died today.

He was a younger brother of the late Sir Edwin Chadwick, the eminent sanitary philosopher of England, and was born at Jessamine Cottage, St. Thomas, Exeter, his father, James Chadwick, being editor of the Western Times, published at Exeter. It was due to his efforts that the present game of American baseball was evolved from the old-time game of "bowls."

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
