October Was Colder Than in 1906 Nine Days at the Freezing Point

Weather Figures for This Month and Year Ago of Much Interest.

Taken on an average the month of
October this year was colder by far
than that of a year ago.

The present month was also a
drier one than that of 1906, the differ-
ence in precipitation being over three
inches.

The highest temperature this month
was 74 degrees, the lowest, 20, de-
grees. Last year the highest registra-
tion during October was 74, and the
lowest 26.

During the present month there were
fifteen days when the temperature
dropped below 35 degrees as against
eleven days a year ago. There were
nine days this October when the tem-
perature was at or below freezing
point, against ten last year, when the
temperature hovered between a 32 de-
gree and a 40 degree.

There were more days this year, when the
degrees. Last year the highest registra-
tion during October was 74, and the
lowest 26.

During sixteen days of October last
year the thermometer showed a tem-
perature of over 60 degrees, and this
month there were but eight such days.

The Union Cigarmakers Hold a Dance

The Cigarmakers' Union held a very
successful dance last night in the City
Hall, over 80 couples being present.
The evening proved to be a very en-

Discovery of a London Scientist

Mr. James Frasche, formerly chemist for
the Imperial Oil Company, in this city,
has recently come very prominently be-
fore scientists of the United States, owing
to several inventions which he has per-
fected and which it is said will revolu-
tionize many industries, especially those
using large quantities of sulphur.

Mr. Frasche left this city about eight
years ago to enter the employ of the
Standard Oil Company. His leaving here
was the result of a discovery which he
made and perfected in this city. For some
time oil men had been endeavoring to ob-
tain in charge of a large refining estab-
lishment. Mr. Frasche improved his pro-
cess later and about five years ago the
Standard Oil Company discovered that on
certain property that it had in Texas
there were large deposits of sulphur. Owing
to the sandy nature of the soil it was
found that it cost more to produce than
it was worth. Mr. Frasche asked to be

allowed to experiment and was sent to
Texas.

He saw at once that it would be im-
practical to attempt to dig the sulphur
out, and after much scheming he upon
the idea of rendering the sulphur liquid
by means of electric heaters, and then
pumping it out. The plan worked fine for
several days and then it was found that
the sulphur was gone, as the strata in
which it lay were uneven. Mr. Frasche
then invented the scheme that has proven
successful. He drove a number of shafts
around the place where he had at first
pumped the sulphur out and placed pipes
in them. Superheated steam was forced
down and the sulphur being melted, ran
into the former hollows, from which it
was easily pumped.

The effect has been to reduce the cost
of sulphur in America over 50 per cent and
to practically exclude all foreign sulphur
from coming into the country. In Sicily
and Italy, the world's largest sulphur-
producing countries, the effect has been
to throw thousands of men out of work
and extinguish what was practically a
national industry.

At present sulphur is being sent from
America to Europe and a better grade is
being supplied at less than it costs to pro-
duce it in that country.

ate of just how much power really can
be produced for that, but there is little
doubt that the figures will be a surprise
to many of the manufacturers, not only
of London, but of Canada also.

The gentlemen from Toronto were very
much pleased also with the working of the
gas engines in Canada for electric light-
ing purposes and were especially inter-
ested in electric lighting plants for small
towns.

There is no reason why every village
in Canada should not have its own elec-
tric lighting plant," said Mr. Hunter.
"Producer gas is beyond the experimental
stage now, and has been proven a success.
It will revolutionize the electric light-
ing power producing question and prove the
most economical means of producing
power that has ever been discovered. For
certainly, it is more convenient to the
consumer, and has innumerable advantages over other
plants because the power being so cheap,
motor-driven machinery can be installed
with advantage."

"Compared with steam, for instance,
there is an immense saving. Besides the
reduction in the fuel bill, the necessity
for line shafting is done away with, if
motor-driven machinery is installed, and
in the case of the McClary firm this is
a saving of thousands of dollars. Motor-
driven machinery is the machinery of the future, as it does away
with pulleys and countershafts and saves
considerable in running expenses. Be-
sides this, it is more convenient to the
workman, as by simply pulling over a
lever the operator can instantly obtain
any speed to suit his work. Under the
old system only five or six speeds could
be obtained for a machine. This was
often most convenient for a workman,
especially one working on steel work
such as turning. With a motor-driven
lathe or planer, he can instantly put on
any one of twenty-five different speeds."

After thoroughly inspecting the gas
plant, Manager King took the delegation
through the big works, where they were
given a chance to see how stoves are
turned out in the biggest plant under
the British flag.

"Don't look as if the money market was
affecting these people," said Mayor Law-
rence, as he surveyed the busy shop.
"No," said Manager King. "We were
never busier, and have more work ahead
now than we can possibly get out in
many months. Those reports about us
laying men were circulated by some-
one who knew nothing about the mat-
ter."
