HAS SPENT LARGE SUMS

Story That Ottawa Onnoses a State-Owned Line Absolutely Untrue.

Ottawa, Aug. 21.-The report that Canada has blocked a movement for cheaper cable rates by declining to participate in a cable conference, is without foundation. The record of the present Government demonstrates that it is, and has always been, strongly in favor of cheapening cable rates. This is shown by the fact that the Government strongly promoted the state-owned cable which has been established between Canada and Australia. It is further shown by the financial assistance which was given to the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company. In return for the aid given Canada exacted an undertaking in writing from the Marconi Company that they were only to charge one-half for cable messages the rates charged by cable companies. The financial aid given by the present Government to the Canadian press cable service from Great Britain is another evidence of its desire to facilitate cable communication with the old land.
