The yacht Dinah is in 30 feet of water off Long Point, and her owner Mr. P. J. Watt, and his crew, consisting of Mr. Alex. Harvey, skipper; Robert Watt, of this city, and a young lad named Harry Dowding, had a narrow escape from drowning off the Point during a heavy blow Monday night. The crew consider their escape from drowning most fortunate.

Mr. Watt went down to Hamilton Saturday night to bring his yacht from that city, where it had been left during the winter, to Port Stanley, to be sailed during the summer. With his crew he left Monday, and sailed along well until the evening,

when a strong, northeast blow came up. The Dinah, sailing like a bird, made great time for 43 miles, until off

Long Point.

About 1 e'clock in the morning, the wind grew fresher, and Mr. Watt will be through there in a few days, decided to "come about." As he did so, the wind veered suddenly, carrying and will come here at once. away all his sail.

The boat driften about, when another gust of wind smashed the rudder, leaving the vatch at the mercy of the waves. Thus she drifted in the darkness for a couple of hours, until Mr. Watt

discovered that he was near the south lighthouse. The wind was blowing at a great rate, and a very high sea was running,

making the position of those on the yacht most perilous. When Bob Watt found their exact location, he took Harry Dowding ashore in the dinghy, leaving Mr. Watt and Mr. Harvey in the storm-tossed or any other company desiring to boat. After a heavy struggle he landed the boy, and came back after the

#### BOAT OVERTURNED.

When Bob Watt had got them all aboard he started to row towards shore. A heavy sea struck them and overturned the boat. Mr. P. J. Watt stuck to the dinghy for a time, while the others struck out to swim ashore in the darkness

It was a long swim, but they managed to get safely on land. Mr. P. J. Watt held on for some time, and he, too, struck out for land. He also managed to reach there in safety.

The party continued their search for a place of shelter, and at 3:30 in the morning reached a dwelling, where they remained until morning. All were tired and wet, but most happy to be safe on shore.

#### A BAD STORM.

"It was a bad storm," said Mr. Watt. "When our sail was carried away, we were helpless. We drifted about for a couple of hours in the darkness, and finally decided to make shore.
