**BOY SHOT DEAD
IN A SIDESHOW**

Was Working in Booth Near Shooting Gallery—Killed by Rifle Shot. St. John, N. B., Sept. 8.—A fatal accident happened yesterday on "The Pike" at the Dominion Exhibition. Harry Brandage, a boy 12 years of age, was attending to a booth near the shooting gallery, when a man in the gallery picked up a rifle that had not been discharged, and began to examine the weapon. In some unexplained way the rifle was fired, the bullet entering the boy's heart. Death was almost instantaneous. The lad's mother is a widow.

HAMILTON ROAD FOLK AT ODDS OVER SEWER

Work Has Been Initiated, But Strong Deputation Declares It Unnecessary.

Deputations before the meeting of the board of works last night were numerous, and considerable time of No. 2 committee was taken up listening to arguments on a variety of subjects. The largest deputation was that regarding the Hamilton road sewer. When this work was initiated at the request of a large number of the rate-payers, there was no opposition, and the bylaw was passed. Since then, considerable opposition has developed. Mr. C. G. Jarvis represented those opposed to the sewer. He stated that there were 27 residents of the street, owning nearly half the property, who were opposed to the improvement. They felt that at the present time they could not afford to pay for it. He asked the committee to quash the by-law. Several others spoke in the same strain. On that street, he declared, those present who favored the sewer. Mr. J. Homister, W. Gray and J. Summers declared that one was needed, and they were willing to pay their share. Some of them had gone to considerable expense making preparation to tap the sewer on the strength of the bylaw passing. After some argument, Ald. Saunders moved that the matter lay over for one week, and in the meantime City Engineer Wright will report on the property benefited, the direction of the sewer and his opinion as to its necessity.

Wants Street Improved.

Mr. John Forristal, of the Petrolia Barrel Works, appeared before the committee and asked that something be done to Simcoe street in front of his property. "I have been living here for over thirty years, and not \$25 has been spent on that street," he declared. "We have paid out over a million dollars in wages, besides heavy taxes, with practically no fire protection, and have received nothing in return. I sometimes feel like moving out."

The Motion Carried.

City Architect Nutter was instructed to confer with the water commissioners as to the best method of closing up half the arcade in order to provide room for the electrical department. The board of works will also look into this matter. The suggestion of Mayor Beattie that a paving plant be secured, was laid over for two weeks, and it is expected that an investigating deputation will visit Toronto and Hamilton. A new petition to open up Lorrie avenue will be prepared, and in the meantime the committee will endeavor to settle the points of difference between the residents.
