London, April 15 .- In resuming the debate in the House of Commons today on the "Government of Ireland Bill," which was introduced in Parliament on April 11 by Premier, Asquith, ex-Premier A. J. Balfour ridiculed the Government measure for Irish home rule, describing it as "an unsymmetrical and botched federal heme, utterly unworthy of British atešmanship.'


