WILL ASQUITH ACT?

ITH the Mexican trouble holding the large place in the news, the Ulster situation finds a difficulty in claiming public interest, yet the most sensational news of all to Britishers is contained in the recent dispatches that the Ulstermen have snapped their fingers in the face of Asquith by importing rifles in large numbers, and bullying revenue officials. Asquith cannot long permit more of these outrages. "Watchful waiting" will need to be discared with more dispatch than in Mexico, and for greater cause. Acts of open rebellion confront the Prime Minister. His next move will no doubt be decisive, and a stinging lesson to the rebels.

MEXICO AND THE UNITED STATES. HERE can be but one voice in this Country with reference to the difficulties now being met in Mexico, by the United States, and that voice expresses a hope that the United States will soon end all difficulty and that the rulers of that nation, from the President down, to whom war is abhorrent, will have peace. It is a world-wide pity that they have been forced into any action at all.

Charles Sumner, one of their greatest orators, has, as far back as 1845, correctly voiced the sentiments of ex-President Taft and President Wilson, and all the leaders of both parties today. He

"In our age there can be no peace that is not honorable; there can be no war that is not dishonorable. The true honor of a nation is to be found only in deeds of justice and in the happiness of its people, all of which are inconsistent with war. In the clear eye of Christian Judgment, vain are its victories: infamous are its spoils. He is the true benefactor, and alone worthy of honor, who brings comfort where before was wretchedness; who dries the tear of sorrow; who pours oil into the wounds of the unfortunate: who feeds the hungry and clothes the naked; who unlooses the fetters of the slave; who does justice; who enlightens the ignorant; who enlivens and exalts, by his virtuous genius, in art, in literature, in science, the hours of life; who by words or actions inspires a love for God and man. This is the Christian hero; this is the man of honor in a Christian land. He is no benefactor, nor deserving of honor, whatever may be his worldly renown, whose life is passed in acts of force; who renounces the great law of Christian brotherhood: whose vocation is blood; who triumphs

in battle over his fellowmen. ful glories for ourselves, let us strive to of "Kind regards, yours truly." extend them to other lands. Let the bugles sound the truce of God to the whole world forever. And now on this Sabbath of our country lay a new stone in the grand temple of universal peace. whose dome shall be as lofty as the comprehensive as the earth itself."

It is no fault of the United States Government that they have been forced to act. Let us hope it will not reach the proportions of actual war.
