WOMEN'S STORIES WIDELY DIFFERENT

Murder Case in Which Matron Is Shot in Doctor's Office.

DETECTIVES SEEK A GUN

Doctor's Wife Denies Ever Having Seen Victim of Tragedy.

FREEPORT, N. Y., July 2.—While Mrs. Edwin Carman was in Hempstead this afternoon for the purpose of viewing the body of Mrs. Louise Bailey, the handsome Long Island matron, who was mysteriously shot to death through a window in Dr. Carman's office here Tuesday night, detectives were hard at work pumping out a cesspool and a well in the rear of the physician's residence, and a cesspool in the cellar, in search for a .38-calibre revolver, with the exploded shell in it. At a late hour

tonight the hunt for the weapon was still in progress.

The body of the murdered woman was taken from her home in Hempstead to an undertaker's morgue in that town for the purpose of performing an autopsy, which had been ordered by the district attorney.

After viewing the body, Mrs. Carman said: "I have never seen that woman in my whole life."

Autopsy Shows Nothing.

Nothing bearing on the tragedy was revealed by the autopsy. Detectives today interviewed Miss Helen Combs, a lawyer's stenographer, who told them she was in the physician's house at the time of the shooting, having gone there for treatment. She said she was admitted to the house by Mrs. Carman, whom, she said, she knows very well. Dr. Carman was eating dinner at that time, and Miss Combs said she was told to wait.

"While I was there," Miss Combs is said to have told the detectives, "a woman, whom I now know was Mrs. Bailey, arrived. She did not knock or announce herself. She walked right in, and a few moments later went to the doctor's office. While she was there, Mrs. Carman passed through the room and went into the kitchen at the rear of the

house. Later she went out on the porch, and while she was there I heard her tell one of the children not to play the piano, as the doctor had a patient in the office. That was about ten minutes before I heard a shot."

Mrs. Carman's Story.

In telling her story to the detectives and the district attorney yesterday, Mrs. Carman declared that she had returned from New York about 7 o'clock the night of the murder and had gone immediately to her room on the second floor of the house, where she had prepared to retire. She denied that she had come down to the ground floor, even when the shot was fired.

Miss Combs, the detectives also say, told them that it was a woman, and not Dr. Carman who folded Mrs. Bailey's hands across her breast after the body

had been placed upon the office couch.

Joseph Golder, another patient who was waiting to consult Dr. Carman, also told the police it was a woman who did this. Dr. Carman told the police it was he who folded Mrs. Bailey's hands.

The inquest into the murder will be held here tomorrow afternoon. Representatives of the district attorney's office said this afternoon one or more arrests might be expected at any moment.

SCHOONER WRECKED OFF MAINE.

KENNEBUNKPORT, ME., July 2.—The two-masted, coal-burner schooner, Mary Augusta, was wrecked on the rocks of Waller's Point today. Captain Tainter and the women of his crew, landed safely in the power boat before the vessel broke up. The vessel was built 47 years ago.

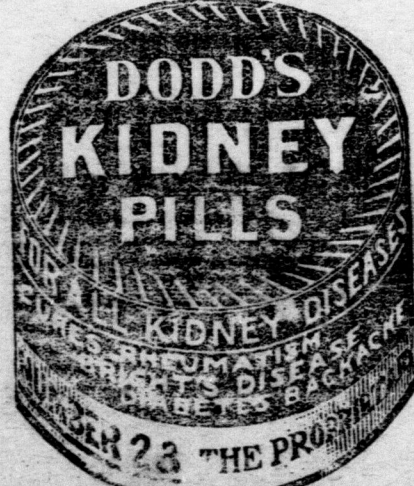

Students Battle With Police During Funeral Procession

VIENNA, July 2.—The anti-Serbian agitation, which is becoming an exceedingly dangerous symptom shows no sign of abating. Even while the funeral cortege of the archduke and his wife was on its way to the Hofburg today, hundreds of excited students were engaged in a desperate struggle with the police to reach the Serbian legation, within three blocks of the procession.

Strong forces of mounted and foot gendarmes have guarded all the approaches to the legation ever since the serious demonstration on Tuesday, and when it was seen that the attack would be renewed, 500 reinforcements were hastily summoned. They rushed to the scene, and the crowd booed and yelled, but the police succeeded in controlling the situation, and finally, after a great struggle, dispersed the students.
