

"HAND-PICKED" MEN FOR PRINCESS PATS, DESIRE OF OFFICERS

Therefore Recruits Are Under-
going Another Board.

Recruiting for the Princess Patricia's Regiment and the local machine gun brigade is progressing favorably, it was announced at Wolsley Barracks this morning. No campaign has been launched for recruits, but many young men have joined in with both units during the past week. If they continue to move in from now on, officers of both regiments are confident that the entire quota will be in uniform within a few days.

Members of the P. P. C. L. I. are being re-boarded for the purpose of weeding out any men who are not up to the physical standard. Col. W. J. Brown stated today that the officers of the unit are anxious that the best type of men should be members and for this reason several will be dropped. When that was investigated in Toronto a number of men were passed who should not have been admitted and these were discharged as soon as the medical board reports on them.

May Be Divided. When at full strength, this regiment will number about 500 members. It will be divided into companies and recruiting is completed and these companies will be stationed at different military authorities. The entire unit will be in London for several months of the year, and when the time comes for breaking it up this city will retain at least one company.

The Princess Pats are hard at work now, the entire regiment taking routine training every day at the barracks. The organization of a band is also continuing and it promises to be one of the best brass bands in this part of the country.

Gunners Doing Well. Recruits are coming in for the machine gun brigade, which is commanded by Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles. This unit is proving very popular with ex-service men who served with the "Suicide Corps" in European fields. The training of this unit is different from that of the ordinary infantry, and its officers claim the training is most interesting. When at full strength the unit will boast 300 officers and men.

In the event of the entire Princess Pat regiment being left in this city, London's peace time force will number between 700 and 800 available men. The headquarters staff now numbers about 150 officers and men, as compared with between 20 and 30 in the days preceding the war.

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MUNICIPAL TAX ON ALL VEHICLES TO BE DROPPED

Too Hard to Collect Says Inspector and Gives Figures

No municipal tax on vehicles will be imposed this year, if the recommendation of No. 1 committee Wednesday is adopted by the city council.

Vain efforts have been made to enforce the law for three years. Inspector J. W. McCallum reported to the committee that the task was practically impossible, as there was not sufficient personnel to carry it out properly. This year only about 2,700 tags were taken out. As more than 8,000 provincial licenses for automobiles are issued for London and the district, it seemed obvious to the committee that only a small proportion of vehicle owners had complied with the bylaw, particularly when the number of other motor vehicles in addition to automobiles was considered.

Ald. O. I. Cunningham thought that the vehicles should be taxed. He pointed out that the residents of street pay for the pavement, but the vehicle owner makes use of it. In reply to this, other members pointed out that 40 per cent of the city paying is paid from the general rate. Ald. Cunningham replied that the average citizen paid his share of this 40 per cent as well, so that inequality was not made up by this means.

LIGHTING EXTENSION PLANS
TO BE LEFT IN ABEYANCE

Big Schemes Fall Flat Because of Power Shortage.

No street lighting extensions are likely to be made this year because of the power shortage. General Manager E. V. Buchanan told No. 1 committee of the city council on Wednesday that it would be well to leave the plans for this work in abeyance.

The plan proposed was an extensive one, and would have done much to improve lighting conditions in the city. It was planned to extend the ornamental lighting east on Dundas street to Queen's Park, and north on Richmond street to the C. P. R. station. In addition to this it was suggested that a light be placed on every pole in the central part of the city, and also on all the main thoroughfares. This was intended to improve traffic conditions.

Some details of the plan were worked out, and a conference between the committee and the city engineer, Mr. J. H. Marshall, was held on Wednesday. The plan was deferred until this year, but is not likely to be placed in effect at least until the power shortage has been overcome.

Minor additions to the lighting system may be made. Ald. G. B. Drake of No. 3 committee applied to No. 1 committee yesterday to have a light placed on the Hamilton road "V." A report will be made on this.

PREMIER-ELECT WILL TRY
TO PAY VETERANS MONEY

Giving Attention To Trouble Over Enumerators' Salaries.

Replying to a letter sent him by the local command of the G. W. V. A. requesting that an investigation be made into the matter of the veterans who were employed as enumerators in the last provincial elections did not receive pay for work done by them on a Sunday, Premier E. C. Drury, in a letter received by the association this morning, said he would place all the matter in the hands of the attorney-general. The premier promised to see what could be done in the matter.

The complaint was made that the veterans of the city were promised \$40 for ten days' work, and if the work was properly done in less time that the same amount of money would be paid. Many of them worked all one Sunday to get the reports in on time, but when the money for the work was received they were not paid for Sunday, while others who took Monday to complete the work received full pay.

FUNERAL OF STEPHEN NOXON. The funeral of Stephen Noxon was held this afternoon from the family residence, Oxford street, to the Ingersoll Rural Cemetery, and was attended by many citizens. The services were conducted by Rev. (Capt.) Ronald MacLeod of Toronto, formerly pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, of which Mr. Noxon was a member. The pallbearers were D. G. Cuthbertson, Dr. Canfield, John E. Boles, R. J. Robertson, John E. Gayler and J. R. Stone.

Even in London, in certain lines of trade, the early closing has proven a success. Some of the larger stores of the city do not remain open after five o'clock, while drug stores, which were formerly open until late at night, now close at eight o'clock. Prominent druggists state that they do just as big business during the shorter hours as they did when they formerly remained open late. The shorter hours increase the efficiency of the clerks, it is claimed, and mistakes are not as frequently made as formerly.

Labor leaders in London hope that within a year they will have practically all lines of labor organized in London. There are more than forty unions in London at present, representing it is claimed, a majority of the working people of the city. These leaders do not believe that it is necessary for the workmen or women to labor late in the evening, except on special occasions.

AERODROME ON INDUSTRIAL AREA NOW BIG PROBABILITY

Would Be Temporary Site To Keep Up With Demand.

A municipal aerodrome may be established temporarily on the newly-purchased industrial area in the east-central part of the city. No. 1 committee Wednesday referred the matter to the town planning committee for consideration. This committee is not officially in existence yet, as it must be approved by the council. If it is brought into existence, the question of a municipal aerodrome will be one of the first to come before it.

The matter has been before the council for some months, but has been laid over. Referring it to the town planning committee has solved the question of what to do, laid over again, but Ald. Cameron Wilson maintained that this question would be an important one soon, and suggested that a special committee should investigate. He said there would be aerial mail service and other aerial ventures in Canada soon, and London should be prepared to benefit by them.
