## **BECOME PROHIBITION** DRINK IN STATES

Known As Paraguay Tea.

IS MAKING INQUIRIES

One U. S. Manufacturer Trying To Find Out About Importation of Drink.

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 10.—Bottled nate or Paraguay tea, the famous South American beverage, may become prohibition drink in the United States. One North American manufacturer of beverages is making inquiries in Buenos Aires to ascertain whether to import the mate herb from Argentina and introduce it to North Ameri-

Drinking mate through the bombilla bombilla, a metal tube about six inches long, with the thickness of a pencil, is fan-shaped at the end, and dotted with small holes like a sieve, through which the liquid is drunk from a sun-dried sourd about the size of a large apple. The liquid is prepared by filling the gourd with the herb, then boiling water gourd with the herb, then boiling water is added. The hest takes the first drink and the gourd is refilled and handed to the guests in succession. The supply of mate is renewed as is required. Silver and even gold gourds are now used by wealthy families.

Mate is grown extensively in the extreme northeastern section of Argentina, Paraguay and Brazil, where large tracts of land are given over to its cultivation.

The herb possesses astringent qualities which makes it an invaluable beverage among the farming people who consume large quantities of meat daily, this, together with hard biscuits, in some parts of the republic, being the only articles of food.

### RANEY CHARGES THAT LIBERTY LEAGUE IS **OUT TO DEFEAT HIM**

South American Beverage Attorney-General Opens Campaign in Wellington at Fergus.

**FAVORS TEMPERANCE ACT** 

Will Support Measure to the Limit-Outlines His Duties.

FERGUS, Ont., Feb. 10 .- Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, accompanied by Premier E. C. Drury opened his campaign in the bye-election in East Wellington here tonight. Both min-Wellington here tonight. Both ministers received a hearty greeting
Hon. Mr. Raney devoted some attention to the Citizens' Liberty League, which he said, was ready to spend \$20,000 to defeat him, and which he declared would require more than \$200,000 to do so. In this connection he head a letter, which he said, had been sent to the race track proprietors in Ontarlo in circular form, signed by T. L. Carruthers, general secretary of the league, dated Toronto, January 28, 1920, and which read as follows: league, dated Toronto, January 28, 1920, and which read as follows:

"In view of the coming election in which Mr. Raney, attorney-general, will seek to obtain a seat somewhere in Ontario this league has taken into ac-Ontario this league has taken into account his continuous and uncompromising actions towards race tracks, and his stand on prohibition, and we have decided that we must oppose him at the polls. This will entail an expenditure of about \$20,000, and we are asking our friends to help us financially. We will appreaciate it if you can seen your way to contribute."

"This is not true," he asserted. "I am no more opposed to that than I am to baseball, or golf, or cricket, or any other outdoor game or pastime." He said he did not think his opposition to race track gambling should disqualify him from office; on the contrary, he regarded it as rather a qualification.
