PREHISTORIC INDIANS KNEW THE SURGEON'S ART.

While the prehistoric Indians of South skillful workers in the precious metals, their achievements in surgery have been given less general recognition than they merit. Amputation of bones was unknown to them, but trephining was of common occurrence. Some of the prehistoric tribes of this continent were familiar with the use of splints, as was recently discovered by investigators from the American Museum of Natural History, excavating in New Mexico, who uncovered skeletal remains to which several splints were still partially

In Peru and Bolivia, where stones from slings, the "bola" or "lliui" and wooden clubs with heads of stone and copper were the common offensive weans, complex fracture of the skull, with depression of the bony plates, must ave been very common. A fracture of e skull sometimes resulted in almost instant death, but many victims sur-vived wounds of this sort, and an attempt to remove splinters of bone that pricked the brain, or to cut out frag-ments that pressed upon it, must have become at an early date a natural pro cedure. From such operations on ternal injuries to similar ones internal maladies, and possibly for re-ligious purposes, the step was com-paratively short. That trephining did occur in such cases seems indicated by the fact that trephined skulls have been found which bear no evidence of lesion. For performing the operation implements of copper and bronze and knives of stone and obsidian were undoubtedly employed. Rarely the method of boring was resorted to.
