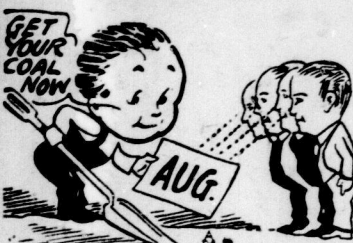

SEASON'S CROP BURNED IN BARN

Heavy Damage Caused by Fire On Harwich Township Farm.

Chatham, Aug. 20.—Spontaneous combustion caused a fire which destroyed two large barns of Sam McKibben, Gravel road, Harwich Township, last night. The barns contained the season's crop of hay and 750 bushels of new wheat. Mr. McKibben succeeded in getting all the live stock out of the building in safety, with the exception of four calves. In an attempt to get their motor car out of the barn, Mrs. McKibben suffered painful burns about the neck and shoulders.
Magistrate Carscallen in the county police court today decided that the truck seized by License Inspector Side near Thamesville on July 27, while transporting a load of beer, should not be confiscated by the government, but returned to the manufacturer. It appears that while negotiations had been under way for the purchase of the truck, the deal had not been closed and the vehicle was turned over to the prospective purchaser by an employee without authority. The first knowledge the company had of the delivery of the truck was after it was seized. The magistrate held that as the truck had been delivered without the knowledge of the company by an employee without authority, and that delivery was not known until after it was seized, the government had no right to confiscate it.

TOURISTS START CAMPAIGN TO AMEND LIQUOR ACT

HEATED DISCUSSION ENDS IN REFUSAL OF REQUEST

Trades Council Declines To Support Unemployed in Appointing Executive.

TITE IS CRITICAL

President McGuire and Supporter of Motion Hold Lively Intercourse.

Last night at its regular meeting the London Trades and Labor Council declined to acquiesce in the request of the newly-elected committee on behalf of the unemployed of the city to appoint five representatives to act on the committee along with five representatives of the London Labor Party and five representatives chosen from the ranks of the unemployed.
The decision was arrived at only after heated discussion upon a motion proposed by William Tite and Albert Graves that the request be referred to the executive committee. The motion was declared lost on a vote of 10 to 3. John Lewis being the mover and second.
In moving the motion Mr. Tite declared that it was not a communist movement, though unfortunately otherwise a number of communists were connected with it. He stated that for over a year he had been trying to get the unemployed to organize and do something for themselves, with the result that recently some action was taken and the meeting for 'night' the unemployed called last Friday night.
John McGuire, president of the council, emphatically declared that the committee on the unemployed was not to be appointed at the present time and under the present circumstances.
"If that is all the sympathy the council is going to give the unemployed I think you'll see some of the unions will take strong action in the matter."
"That's just an opinion," rejoined Mr. McGuire.

Supports Tite.

Albert Graves supported Mr. Tite in his motion and pointed out that the unemployed were not after charity, but had begun a campaign to secure work.
R. A. Hessel, vice-president of the council, criticized those behind the formation of the new organization for not having attended the meetings of the council in the past, and for failing to assist the council in its recent campaign to improve the conditions of organized labor in the city. He said, "though I am not prepared to say that they are using it that way."
Mr. Tite expressed the hope that the press would give full scope to the stand taken on the question by the president and vice-president, and promised that when he placed their stand before his local action would be forthcoming.
Mr. McGuire—I am entitled to my opinion.
Mr. Tite—Yes, and I'm entitled to mine. You're only one member, the same as anybody else.
Mr. McGuire—The president desires the privilege of bringing himself plain, and he doesn't care to monopolize the meeting to do so either.
John Darling, secretary of the council, remarked that it seemed strange only 150 unemployed had registered at the city hall when there are supposed to be 1,000 men out of work in the city.

McGuire Objects.
Mr. McGuire objected to any delegate claiming that the council was unsympathetic because of any opinion expressed by himself as president. "The council," he explained, "was willing to help the unemployed, but not to help others who were taking advantage of the unemployed."
Mr. Tite—who and what organization are taking advantage of the unemployed? I'm entitled to that information, am I not?
Mr. McGuire—Are you? You've got your own intelligence.
Mr. Tite—Yes, I've got my own intelligence, and very little opinion of yours.
Mr. Graves arose to point out that communists were everywhere. "They might criticize us if we were members of the committee," he said. "To oppose it because they are on the committee is ignorance."
Mr. McGuire—I would like to point out to Delegates Tite and Graves that they have been the only ones to use the term communists at this meeting.

Mr. Tite—That's what both you and the vice-president have reference too though. You told me to use my intelligence.
Mr. McGuire—Well that's all right. Mr. Hessel rose hurriedly to protest. "No, I didn't say anything of the kind. Delegate Tite. Don't you start putting words into my mouth. I'll do my own speaking."
Fred Burke, who had come in late, asked: "Are we discussing the question as to whether we should or should not be sympathetic toward the Communist movement?"

Upon being informed of the question under discussion, Mr. Burke stated that he was not in favor of following the lead of men, who stayed out of the unions to save their own little dues, and then finding themselves in a tight boat, started a new movement. He declared that he had no sympathy for such men, and opposed the appointment of any representatives on the committee.

The Request.
The request to the council was contained in the following letter, signed by R. Foxcroft:
"At a mass meeting of unemployed held on Friday, August 15, it was agreed to form an unemployed council. Such councils are being formed throughout the Dominion of Canada, consisting of unemployed tradesmen, Councils and Labor organizations. The executive is made up of five members of unemployed, five members of both councils, five from labor parties and three from labor organizations. Will you please elect your delegates to attend the executive on Tuesday evening, mass meeting on Friday evening at the Labor Temple at 8 p.m."

"It is unnecessary to impress upon you the urgency of this movement."

The following resolution, forwarded by the Guelph Trades and Labor Council, was ruled out of order by

the president on the score of "no jurisdiction."
"Whereas," the minister of labor, Hon. James O'Rourke, is credited with saying, during the postal strike, that the postal workers could stay out till they were paid, and whereas the said minister has repeatedly adopted an attitude unfavorable to organized labor, and whereas it has been customary for the minister of labor to address the Trades Congress at its annual convention, therefore be it resolved that this local union, No. 830, Steam and Operating Engineers, unanimously and emphatically protest against the present minister of labor being allowed to speak at the coming convention in London, and be it also resolved that we respectfully request the Guelph Trades and Labor Council to send a similar resolution to the executive of the congress, and also send copies of this resolution to all local unions in Guelph and to the trades councils of the province asking them to send similar protests to the trades and labor congress."

Adopt Resolution.

The following resolution, proposed by Mr. Tite, was unanimously adopted:
"Whereas, the legislature of Ontario has an agreement with the Dominion government to establish an advisory board, to which the Ontario Service Council of Ontario, and whereas, the late provincial government in appointing the personnel to the above board, did appoint four members, four for two years, and four for three years, the terms of service of the first and second years having been completed, the present government has not reappointed or appointed any other persons to the board, thereby allowing this useful body to die a slow death, be it resolved that the executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada request the legislature of Ontario to place this most important body on a sound working basis."

Communication from Tom Moore, president of the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress, regarding information to be placed before the unemployment conference being held in Ottawa on September 2, which was to the condition of the building trades, was passed on to the carpenter district council.

Mr. Moore wrote that the purpose of the conference is said to be to agree upon a plan to encourage the carrying out of construction and building work during the winter season as a means of preventing unemployment.

The meeting was brought to a close by addresses by E. W. A. O'Dell, Hamilton, general organizer of the Shoemakers' Union, and John Hulse, representative of the American Federation of Labor in Canada.

BELIEVES CANADA SHOULD HAVE NAVY

Admiral Field Declares It Would Be Great Help To Britain.

Quebec, Aug. 20.—"When you ask me as to the naval defence policy to be adopted by the overseas dominions of the Empire, I would say that it is a very delicate question to consider, but if you would like me to express my opinion on the subject I am willing to state that providing the Dominion of Canada or any other overseas dominion within the British Empire is desirous of maintaining their own navy, it would be, to my mind, the finest thing that could possibly happen the Dominion thus affected; while at the same time it would be a magnificent help to Great Britain." This was the statement in an interview this morning of Vice-Admiral Sir Frederick Field, K.C.B., C.M.G., in command of the British special service squadron, now here on its around-the-world cruise.
In enlarging on the theme, Sir Frederick said: "As you are no doubt aware, recent reports that have been accredited in the press as to the strength of the British navy are strictly accurate in so far as the full text was concerned. I wish to impress upon you the fact that I am not at all over-estimating the navy. It was a magnificent help to Great Britain, but since you put the questions to me in a personal way, I don't mind answering in the same sense, always provided that the impression given does not indicate that I am here advocating any such policy."

"Under the terms of the Washington disarmament conference," he proceeded, "the strength of the British navy was limited to a certain extent, and while we have diminished the number of our naval fighting units, you will readily understand that the vast territory of the British Empire remains as it was, and perhaps, has even been increased. This is to say that that territory must be defended by a smaller fleet."

S. AFRICA'S POVERTY IS REASON FOR ACTION

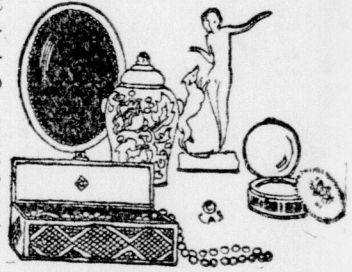

MAJOR C. A. CAMERON FOUND SHOT TO DEATH

Letters Left Show Noted English Soldier in Financial Difficulties.

London, Aug. 20.—Major Cecil Aylmer Cameron, commander of the 46th Battery, Field Artillery, was found shot to death at his quarters in the Sheffield Barracks today. Letters left by the deceased indicated that he was in financial difficulties, and was suffering from disappointment because his wished-for appointment as military attaché at Riga, Latvia, had failed to materialize. Major Cameron was a son of Col. Aylmer Cameron, V.C.

Thirteen years ago Major Cameron and his wife were sentenced to three years' imprisonment for attempted fraud in connection with a claim against an insurance company for theft of a necklace. Mrs. Cameron confessed that she alone was guilty of the attempted fraud. Her husband, she said, had refused to give evidence at the trial, while clearing himself, would render her conviction inevitable.

Major Cameron had been removed from the army on account of his conviction, but was permitted to re-en-

SMUGGLER'S BODY TAKEN FROM NIAGARA RIVER

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Aug. 20.—The body of Alexander Heron Mann, alleged alien smuggler, of Niagara Falls, Ont., was recovered from the Niagara River at the life-saving station at Fort Niagara today. Mann was drowned last Saturday afternoon when he jumped from a boat into the river to escape capture by United States immigration officers after he and Thomas Livingstone of Niagara Falls, Ont., are alleged to have smuggled an alien across the lower river claim. Livingstone is under arrest, awaiting trial.

TWO MEN ARE SHOT DEAD IN CHICKEN PULLERS' WAR

New York, Aug. 20.—Two men were shot to death in what the police termed a resumption of the "chicken pullers' war," which raged fiercely on both sides of the Hudson up to seven years ago, when the authorities brought temporary peace by sending several gang leaders to the electric chair after a series of particularly violent murders.

DOUBLE LIABILITY IS ALMOST HALF MILLION

Money Received by Home Bank Liquidators Amounts To \$450,000.

Toronto, Aug. 20.—The money received by the liquidators of the Home Bank of Canada in settlement of the double liability claim on the shareholders now amounts to \$450,000, it was announced today.
Today was the last day set by the liquidators, Messrs. Clarkson and Weldon, for the shareholders living in Ontario to meet the double liability claim. Shareholders residing outside the province are given till August 25. All have been notified.

ROME COMMEMORATES DEATH OF POPE PIUS X.

Rome, Aug. 20.—Large numbers of candles were lighted and masses of flowers scattered before the tomb of Pope Pius X. in the crypt of St. Peter's today in commemoration of the tenth anniversary of the pontiff's death. Throughout the day there was a continuous stream of people attending masses or remaining in private prayers.
