Toronto, June 30, 8 p. m.—Fair weather  
has been general to-day in Canada, but  
local showers have occurred in all pro-  
vinces and a heavy thunderstorm is re-  
ported from Ottawa. Temperatures of 80  
were general in Ontario and a maximum  
of 88 was recorded at Toronto. Minimum  
and maximum temperatures—Victoria,  
20-60; Kamloops, 54-50; Calgary, 24-50;  
Qu'Appelle, 42-60; Winnipeg, 54-72; Port  
Arthur, 46-68; Parry Sound, 64-78; To-  
ronto, 62-88; Ottawa, 68-80; Montreal,  
58-70; Quebec, 58-68; Halifax, 52-56.

Probabilities:—Lower lakes and Georgian  
Bay—Moderate to fresh south-westerly  
winds; fair and continued very warm  
local thunderstorms, becoming more gen-  
eral on Thursday.

Local temperatures:—The highest and  
lowest readings of the thermometer at  
the Observatory on Tuesday, June 30th,  
1903, were:—Highest, 85 above; lowest, 65  
above.
