THE SCIENCE OF DEFENCE.

How "Watty" Muirhead Got Red himself at Hamilton—The Asylum Robbery Alleged.

(Special Despatch to The World.) HAMILTON, March 31.—Walter Muirhead was tried to-day before Mr. Justice Muirhead on charges of larceny of two barrels of syrup, by value and two boxes of fish from the asylum on the mountain.

Chief engineer Ashfield presented a communication asking that the board advertise for tenders for the men's summer clothing as there was usually much delay and the men had to wear winter clothes in hot weather.
