THAT TRAGEDY AT MINICO.

A VERDICT OF MANSLAUGHTER AGAINST JOHN BYRON.

The second act in the Minico tragedy was played yesterday, when Coroner Lynch commenced an inquiry on the body of John Wade, the victim of Saturday night's fatal shooting. The tragedy was brought on at the suburban train at 10 o'clock. As he entered the train with mangled hands, his very picture of misery, he lay on the rough couch for the murdered man standing in one corner of the car. The prisoner started back and saw the man. He was not dead but he was dying. The great tears rolled down his cheeks and his head dropped to his breast. His emotion was noticed and he was removed to another carriage. He sat there for some time and was then taken to the hospital. He was not seen since.
