Ellor and Anderson immediately went back on a search for the missing bills, but on reaching a cilvert on the Lake Shore-road Anderson tumped up an excuse for alighting from the buggy, and walked into High Park. Ellor says this was the last he saw of his companion. He waited there more than an hour, but Anderson did not return, and Ellor is naturally supplicious of his companion. The pocketbook contain-ing the \$6, Ellor says, belonged to a third party whom they met with, and who carelessly dropped it from his hands. The trip to the lumber regions is indefinitely postponed.
