ARGUMENT REARD FOR REVERSAL OF THE VERDICT.

lis Counsel Bases the Appeal on the Ground That the Judge Convicted Him Without the Aid of the Jury-Wiman's Admission of Embezzlement and Forg-

ery Used Against Him. New York, Jan. 8 .- The appeal in the case of Erastus Wiman from the verdict in the Court of Oyer and Terminer, con-victing Wiman of forgery, was argued today before the general term of the Su-

preme Court. Gen. Benjamin F. Tracey and A. B. Boardman appeared for Wiman and the prosecution was represented by Assistant District Attorney Lindsay.

The argument was begun by General Tracey raising the point that Wiman had not been found guilty of forgery for which he had been indicted, but for drawing more from the first or account of

ing money from the firm on accord. R. G. Dun & Co. Gen. Tracey's Argument,
He contended that the main question
submitted by the trial judge to the jury
related to the criminal transfer from one

General Tracey said that the judge erred in denying the right of the defence to submit evidence as to Wiman's re-sources outside of his bank account, after

sources outside of his bank account, after having permitted the prosecution to show that his account in the bank was never more than \$29,000 and could not possibly have covered Wiman's overdrafts.

"The trial judge," Gen. Tracey said, "had charged the jury as a matter of law, that Wiman was guilty and that the jury must find him so. He took away from the jury every question on which forgery as charged in the indictment could be predicated, and admitted questions on which it could not be predicated."

Wiman's Systematic Embezzlements.

Mr. Lindsay submitted a voluminous brief in support of the verdict. The brief states that "Wiman has been systematically embezzling the funds of the Dun agency, and on the sixth /day of February he was a defaulter to the extent of upwards of \$188,000. He had partially concealed his peculations by means of fictitious entries in the books and by procuring a worthless cheque for \$135,000, drawn by him against a paltry credit in the Central National Bank, to be carried among the firm's assetis, Hecember, 1891, and prior to this he had given the bookkeeper his individual note for \$45,000, which wis carried along for a year and returned to him when he gave the \$135,000 cheque without which the books would have shown a deficiency of upward of \$42,000 then. Neither Mr. Dun nor Mr. Douglas ever knew anything about the \$45,000 note or the cheque for \$185,000.

The Bullinger Forgery.

"On Feb. 6 1893, before the transaction of any business, his balance was \$7592.43. During that day he deposited \$6300, including the cheque for \$5000 apon which he had forged Mr. Bullinger's endorsement.

"On the day in question the defendant instanced James Howell, the cashier of the concern, to draw a cheque for \$5000 to the order of E. W. Bullinger. Howelf drew the cheque and delivered it to the defendant unsigned. Immediately upon receiving the cheque the defendant signed it and then endorsed the name, E. W. Bullinger' on the back of it in a disguised hand and deposited it to his individual credit in the Central National Bank."


