There are at the present time in the town five new buildings in course of construction, and many old ones undergoing repairs and improvements.

Notable among the former is the Graves Vinegar and Pickling Factory, being erected on the Bay Road near the corner of Granville street and within a few rods of the site of the M. &. V. B. Ry. station. This is a fine building 55 ft. long by 36 ft. wide. It is three stories high in front and two on the rear, over an excellent and commodious basement. An extension will be built on the rear for a boiler room, and a large shed created at some distance from the main building to accommodate the main building to accommodate the content of the first shaptist church, of Cleveland, Ohio the church home of Rockefeller, with Mrs. Eaton, arrived in Wollville on Friday, and will spend some days at the Seminary Hotel.
